

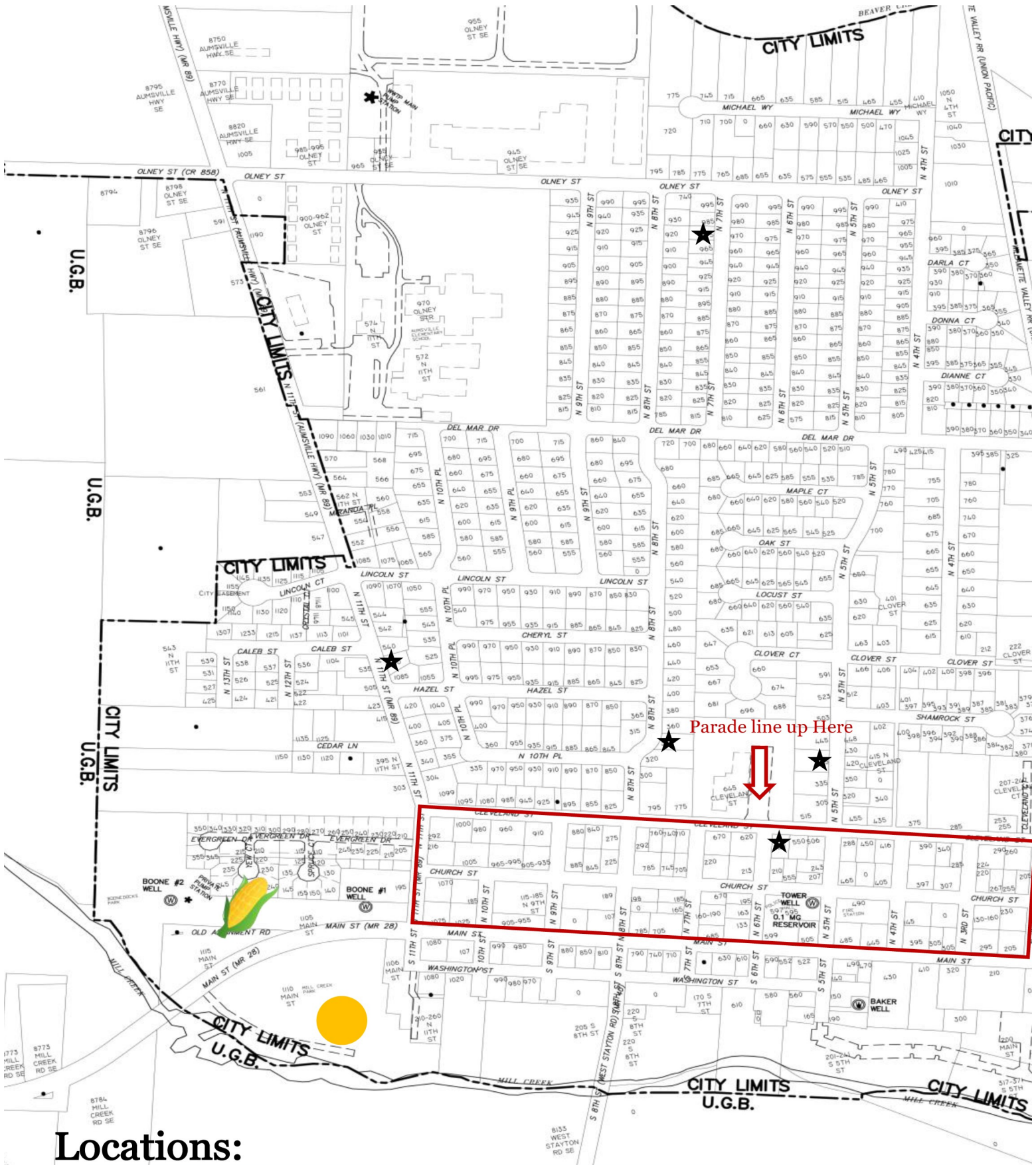

As Chair of the Senate Committee on Health Care, I will be putting together a comprehensive agenda to investigate some of the biggest issues our state is facing related to health care costs and access. 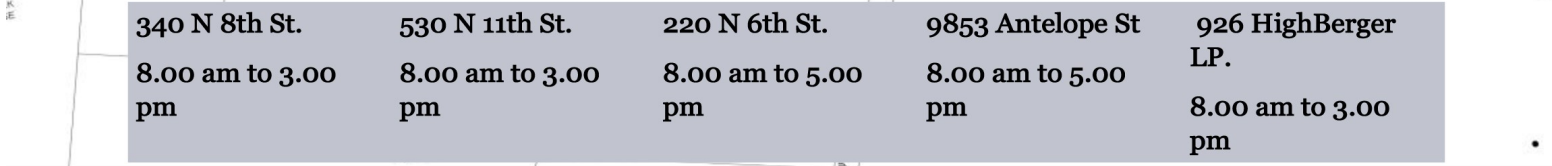

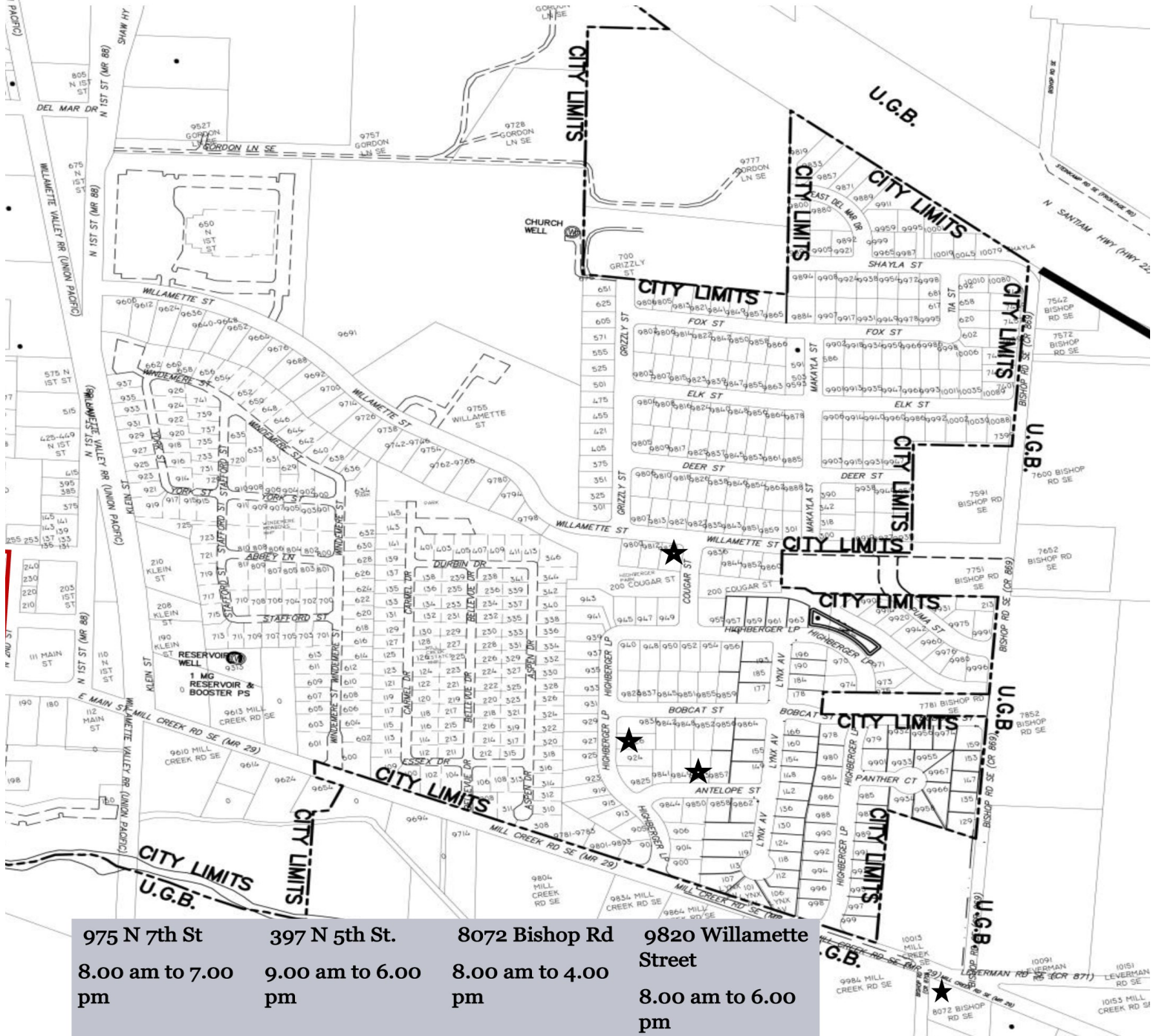

What goes in to making a championship team? I think for every team, it's different, but for this team so many things over the course of 10+ years. A team made up of mostly seniors, 9 in total with 7 of them every-day starters, and just the right mix of underclassmen to bring, not only their talent but, fresh energy to the group. A lot of these girls had been playing together since they were 8-9 years old. They had been in big tournaments and big games before, but maybe not quite to the level of the Oregon 4A State Championship game at Jane Sanders Stadium on the campus of University of Oregon.



I've been asked by quite a few people if playing Marist in our season opener played a big factor in us being able to beat them in the "rematch" for the Championship. The more I think about it and further away we get from it, I believe it did play a big role (more on that later) but definitely wasn't the only factor. It was a long season, from the season opening loss to Marist to our spring break tournament in Redmond to league play and the rain.... all the rain, and hail and more rain. I know it's 100 degrees out now but remember how wet the spring was? We started league by winning our first 16 games, most by a large margin, with 13 of those victories by 8 runs or more. By the end of league, you could tell our team was tired, and rightfully so. The time involved in tarping the field and taking it off again, almost on a daily basis by the end of the season was exhausting. The only blemish to our league record came on Senior Night vs. Sweet Home after a 2 hour delay due to, you guessed it, rain. Not to mention it being our 5th game in 4 days with rival Stayton up next the following day to finish league. As I look back at those 2 games, a 4-3 loss to Sweet Home and 6-5 victory over Stayton, that was just what we needed when we needed it. A humbling loss and hard fought, close victory just before playoffs. That set up a rematch with Yamhill-Carlton (3A State runner-up) who had beaten us 3-2 early in the season at Cascade in a game that had big ramifications for us. A win, and we would host all playoff games until the State Championship. A loss, we would likely have to travel to La Grande for the semi-finals. The girls came out strong with a 6-1 victory that proved to be a catapult for us through the

playoffs. Then, after the long emotional season we get word that our one time pitching coach, Hannah Ganfield, had become ill with Guillain-Barre (gee-YAH -buh-RAY) syndrome, which is a rare disorder in which your body's immune system attacks your nerves, and was in the ICU. While she no longer was a coach on our staff, the love and respect she still had from the girls on our team was evident and inspired a P4H (play for Hannah) mantra. All of these things played big factors in getting to and winning the State Championship. With victories over Hidden Valley 6-0 in the first round, Estacada 7-4 in the quarterfinals and La Grande 5-3 in the semi-finals. That set up for the rematch we all hoped for against Marist in the State Championship.

So, what factor did playing them way back in the first game of the season have on this game? We knew Marist Catholic was a great team. We knew they had an outstanding pitcher. We knew NO ONE gave us a chance to beat them. Except..... WE KNEW we were a much better hitting team now vs. then. WE KNEW they scored 2 of their 3 runs against us due to uncharacteristic errors that we would not make again. WE KNEW each other, trusted, and believed in each other and WE KNEW if we could get to 3 runs we had a great chance to win! The game was low scoring as we expected, but what stood out was the confidence you could see building in our players as they started to put the ball in play off of this "unhittable" pitcher. Defensively we were great all year and very confident in our pitcher being able to keep us in the game long enough to give our bats a chance. When we got runners on base we were aggressive, stealing bases and trying to take extra bases when possible on hits, knowing that scoring opportunities

could be few and far between. As I watched the game over, and over, and yes over again on tape some things really stood out to me. Our girls had faith in each other, you could see it on the field as players were headed to the dugout even as the final out was being made because they knew their teammate "had it". Our team was much better dealing with the pressure of the game as it stayed close throughout. Those close games at the end of the year paid off. When they tried to take extra bases on hits, our

fielders made the plays and threw them out. We talked all year about picking each other up after something bad happens in a game and after an error allowed Marist to take a 2-1 lead in the bottom of the 5th inning our right fielder made an amazing over the shoulder catch for the 3rd out of the inning on a ball hit to the warning track by Marist's best hitter which would have surely scored 2 more runs. This allowed us to tie the game in the top of the 6th inning, when our fastest runner led off with a single, then stole 2nd and then 3rd base before scoring on a sacrifice fly. At that point, as coaches, we knew we were in a great position to win it. And finally, the thing that stood out the most to me was how "non-aggressive" Marist was on the bases. They never attempted to steal a base. Why were they so conservative? Go back to the first game of the year, when our catcher threw out 2 base runners attempting to steal a base! Maybe that first game of the year did play a big factor, only it wasn't what we took out of that game, it was what Marist took out of that game. After holding Marist in the bottom of the 6th inning without a run we were able to string 3 hits in the top of the 7th to take our first lead of the game, 3-2. Confidence was at an all-time high with our team as we headed out for the bottom of the 7th because they were so confident in themselves and their defensive teammates. The ball never left the infield in the bottom of the 7th as Marist went down 1-2-3 and we had done it! STATE CHAMPIONS !!

It is a moment we will never forget. I was happy the girls got the time to take in the surroundings prior to game time. It meant so much to finish the year with the 3rd team state title for the school following Volleyball and Boys Basketball. And for all the seniors, what a way to end their high school careers!

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

June 27, 2022 Meeting Highlights

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 PM. Present in-person were Mayor Clevenger and Councilors Ecclestone, Seney, and Wick, and City Clerk Rogers. Councilors Casarez, Ceja, Lee, and City Administrator (CA) Harding joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: None. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

VISITORS: There were no in-person visitors and no online attendees.

Council reviewed the grant contract BO-4565-22 sub-recipient agreement between Marion County and the city of Aumsville, Oregon. The grant contract will help design and engineer the new Wastewater Facility Plan. Council unanimously voted to authorize CA Harding to sign Grant Contract BO-4565-22 Sub-recipient Agreement between Marion County and the City of Aumsville, Oregon, in the amount of \$1,000,000 for our wastewater system.

Council reviewed a grant contract between the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) and the City of Aumsville. Council unanimously voted to authorize CA

Harding to sign Grant contract 107-2022-5202-77 between the Department of Administrative Services (DAS) and the City of Aumsville, Oregon, for \$900,000 to assist in building a new public works facility.

Council reviewed and unanimously approved the Westech's Engineering Design Service contract for the Public Works Facility design proposal in the amount of \$72,000 from fund 016-811 or 016-810. The City of Aumsville was awarded \$900,000 from HB5202 for our Public Works Facility. Public Works has decided on a pole building type of building with finished office space on the inside. Westech will develop a design-build package for this project since most of these buildings come as "kits" and are pre-engineered. The need for the Public Works office space is just as important as the storage and this option allows us to do this in a much more cost-effective way while keeping the size of the building big enough to store our equipment and supplies.

Council reviewed and unanimously approved the Skateboard Competition Personal and

Professional Services Agreement with CAAKES Unlimited. CA Harding explained that CAAKES will host another skateboard competition on Sunday, August 14th. He stated that this is the same company that hosted last year's competition.

Council reviewed and unanimously approved the Personal and Professional Services Agreement with Unruh Management and Consulting LLC doing business as Oregon Beverage Services (OBS). CA Harding explained that OBS provided the beverage service for the beer garden at last year's Party in the Park. He has discussed some of the issues from last year and they have agreed to have more serving lines and more security on site.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT: CA Harding gave a brief update on the Super Hero Carnival and the grand opening ceremony for the new Maude's building at Saturday Market held on June 25th. Both events were successful and well attended. We had 52 volunteers that signed in at Super Hero Carnival.

The meeting adjourned at 7:15 PM

AUMSVILLE RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT



Good Day, Neighbor!

It is the middle of wildfire season and at the time of this writing we have yet to be activated on a state wide mobilization. At this time last

year we were on mobilization number four or five. This year, we received a grant from the office of the state fire marshal to fund to temporary seasonal fire fighter positions at the fire district specifically to assist in the event of wildland response request. This allows the district to free up staff for some long overdue tasks, such as servicing every hydrant in the fire district. You may have noticed firefighters in your area opening and closing a hydrant near your house.

Dry warm weather brings with it challenges for firefighters. Please

help us reduce our fire response by using extreme care with barbecues or other outdoor fire related devices. Always have a hose or other extinguishing equipment nearby during warm dry conditions.

We continue to research options for the remodel or replacement of our administrative offices and training/living areas. In September the board will review results of our most recent survey as well as options presented by our architects.

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AUMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS



Aumsville Historical Society met on Thursday, June 9th. A casual snack buffet was enjoyed before the business meeting. Roger Porter displayed some books and pictures about his pioneer Porter ancestors. It was announced that recently three members of the Silverton Country Historical Society visited Aumsville's museum. It was interesting and informative to learn about the management of other museums in our area.

The guest speaker was Kylie Pine, Curator and Collections Manager of Willamette Heritage Center at 1313 Mill Street in Salem. The primary building on the five acre property is the Thomas Kay Woolen Mill. The original mill was built in 1889. That building burned in 1895 and was replaced by the brick building, which is still there. Four generations of the Kay family operated the mill, but the business closed about 1960. Today's visitors can see the antique machinery process sheep's wool into cloth. They can also tour the museum and visit the other historic buildings, which have been relocated near the mill.

One of them is Jason Lee's house which was originally at 206 12th Street SE. It is the oldest frame house in Oregon. Rev. Lee, his

nephew Daniel and several craftsmen came overland in 1834 to establish the first Protestant church and school in the Pacific Northwest. The two-story, single family home served as the parsonage.

Also on display is the John Boon house, a modest single story home. He and his family came to Oregon in 1845. He operated a store and assisted the community in many ways. He has the distinction of having been the last Treasurer of Oregon Territory and the first Treasurer of the State of Oregon.
