CITY COUNCIL SEAT VACANCY

There is one vacant position on the Aumsville City Council. This is a four-year term position that begins January 1st, 2021. The council meets twice a month on the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Mondays at 7:00 PM. They also meet as members of the budget committee in the spring for about five weeks.

The council is composed of a mayor and six councilors. The council approves laws and sets policies, which are carried out by city staff.

♦ To qualify, you must reside within the city limits for at least one year prior to the appointment, and be a registered voter.

To apply for a seat, fill out the form online or pick up a form at City Hall. The deadline for submitting your form is December 30, 2020.





Good Day Neighbor,

It's been an incredibly taxing fire year for the Aumsville Fire District. As part of our Mutual Aid Agreements with surrounding Fire Districts and the State Fire Marshal's Office, we've spent a record number of personnel and apparatus hours involved in fires statewide and in California. ARFD personnel and equipment have engaged in the Beachie Creek, Green Ridge, Clackamas, Riverside, Slater, Santiam, Holiday Farm, Glass, and August complex fires. These fires have provided our personnel with an opportunity for experience and training they would never get on a local basis. We participate in the State Mobilization Plan with the anticipation that if Aumsville ever needed the assistance from other departments, they would reciprocate and be here to assist us.

Well, winter is almost here. It seems like we've just returned from an exhausting wildfire season and the weather immediately turns cold, which leads us into "chimney fire season". You've heard this all before, but please review the manner in which you operate your heating devices. For wood stoves and fireplaces, be sure you are burning seasoned wood only and that your chimney is intact and free of creosote. Wall heaters and freestanding heaters should be vacuumed and kept free of dust and lint, and combustibles such as blankets, window coverings and boxes/packing material must be well away. If you didn't test your

smoke alarm when you set your clock back, stop reading right now and go press that test button.

Something most homeowners never consider is to provide a logical access point for your chimney. If firefighters have to access your chimney from the roof, how will they do so? If you have vehicles, woodpiles, shrubbery and other items totally surrounding your house with no opening for firefighters to place a ladder, there could be a significant delay in accessing your chimney. On the interior of your house, is your attic access available and clear of clutter?

As freezing weather approaches be cautious when taking that first step off the porch in the morning. Slips and falls cause a significant number of injuries every year, and prevention is the best defense!

Finally, DO NOT forget to water that Christmas tree!

West Stayton School was established in 1861. A series of buildings were used, but there are no records of the early ones. There was a dispute about the name of the commu-

sponded to the request for assistance. She came to the museum and patiently printed in the names of all the students that she could recognize.

AHS has recently become aware of an inter-

nity. When a post office was established, it was named Ale. In 1911 a West Stayton Post Office was opened.

In 1994, West Stayton and North Santiam Schools were consolidated into the Cascade Unified District. In 2002, it was decided to close those two small schools. Many tears were shed as students and staff said goodbye to each other and the building. In the fall, the students were enrolled in other elementary schools, primarily Aumsville and Turner. The West Stayton School site became Cascade's alternative school for students with certain types of special-needs.

A few years ago, AHS received a call about some class pictures, which were stored at the school. These are fine, commercial photos, but the students were not identified by name. Former teacher Mary Ann Damerell re-

esting bit of local history. This part of Marion County suffered considerable damage from the Columbus Day storm on October 12, 1962. A large pine tree on the West Stayton School grounds was blown down. The trunk was at least 6 feet in diameter. A segment of it was used to make a table, which is still at the school.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

The following may not be complete minutes from these meetings. You can find the full approved minutes on our website at www.aumsville.us/city-council.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL Minutes – October 12, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger, Councilors Bambrick, Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Purdy, and Seney. Council absent: None. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding), City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present via Zoom. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

VISITORS: There were 13 online attendees. Login information was provided for members of the community to listen to the discussion.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Steve Sugg, owner of Snake River Solutions, aka Visor, explained that he was having difficulty getting a franchise application from city hall and asked Council for help. CA Harding offered Council insight and stated that he has been emailing with Mr. Sugg about other concerns with his current franchise agreement. In one of his replies to CA Harding, Mr. Sugg asked to convert his current fiber application to a cable franchise. CA Harding then sent the request to our franchise attorney for guidance on the request. This was a couple of weeks ago and was waiting to hear back from the attorney before responding to Mr. Sugg. He apologized that he didn't know it was a time sensitive matter. He will follow up with the attorney and let Mr. Sugg know what the next step will be.

OLD BUSINESS: Draft Vision Plan: CA Harding gave a brief overview of the document, stating that it is the product of several years of public meetings and community input. The goals and objectives were taken directly from the information from those meetings. CC Rogers displayed the document in a flip page format to show Council how it will look on our website. CA Harding said he included all the brainstorm developed issues on the last two pages for transparency and his plan will be to get the plan on the website and develop feedback from the community using the flip software and a survey form.

Ordinance/Code Updates: CA Harding gave a brief history of the updating process. Going forward, staff will work with the attorney on the changes that are needed to ensure the updates comply with current case law. The drafts will be brought to Council for review. Then once completed bring them to Council for the first reading, then two weeks later bring it back for the second reading and adoption. This will give more time for the public to review changes online and give feedback. Council received and reviewed Code Chapters 1, 2, and 3 updates. CA Harding explained that there are several old ordinances that staff suggests repealing as they are no longer relevant to City operations.

He stated that there are several significant changes needing to be discussed regarding the water rates regulation ordinance. He commented that the focus of these changes is equalization of the utility for all customers but also there are a number of changes that create a benefit to our customers. Some of the changes proposed:

- no longer require account deposits
- eliminate the lien process on delinquent bills
- have the owner of the property sign a contract to be responsible for the water bills
- changes to the discount program

CA Harding asked how Council would like to address the senior rate program. After a lengthy discussion, Council consensus was to leave the discount program status quo and come back to the discussion after the water rate analysis is completed. Council consensus was to eliminate the lien process and remove deposits and have owners sign contract to be responsible. CA Harding stated that he will get the discussed changes made to these first three chapters and bring it back to Council for the first readings and review. Staff will work on the best plan for implementation of these changes should Council approve the final ordinance.

NEW BUSINESS: Contract service agreement with Arete Advisors, LLC., anti-virus spyware software provider. CA Harding explained that with all the ransom ware attacks happening in other cities, our IT provider suggested that we hire a cyber security monitoring service. Council moved to authorize CA Harding to move forward with the Arete Advisors, LLC as presented with edits and it was seconded. Motion APPROVED 7-0:

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: COVID-19: CA Harding reported that the Aumsville zip code area had a rise in COVID-19 cases and we are now at 48 positive cases since the beginning of the outbreak.

CA Harding reported that the Event Planning Committee has begun working on some fun ideas to create COVID friendly Christmas events. We won't be able to have our traditional Christmas in the Park event but will still do the Tree Lighting in some format. During the Santa Visit, Santa will stay in the firetruck and goodie bags will be distributed. New ideas include Mill Creek Carriage touring through town with carolers singing favorite Christmas songs. The horse drawn carriage will be decked out with lights and decorations. We are also looking at doing a residential and commercial decorating contest.

CA Harding reported that he had someone contact him with a question about Manufactured Home Parks (MHP) having different rules than the rest of the city. He stated that the MHPs do have some different rules regarding streets and infrastructure. These are privately owned by 11the park, so we can't enforce traffic or parking issues. Most other city ordinances do apply to park residents. It is always best to contact the city with any questions regarding ordinances.

ADJOURNED WITHOUT PREJUDICE AT 8:51 PM

Minutes – October 26, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger, Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Purdy, and Seney. Council absent: Bambrick. City Administrator (CA) Harding, City Clerk (CC) Rogers were also present via Zoom. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

VISITORS: There were five online attendees. Login information was provided for members of the community to listen to the discussion. There were no public comments at this time.

PUBLIC HEARING: Municipal Code Ordinance Update Chapters 1 & 3

Mayor Clevenger opened the Public Hearing at 7:08 PM. CA Harding presented the staff report. There was no Public Comment regarding the Public Hearing.

Mayor Clevenger closed the Public Hearing at 7:27 PM

There was no Council deliberation or discussion. The first readings of the following ordinances were read by title only and unanimously passed by Council:

- Ordinance No. 671 regarding the Aumsville Planning Commission (APC): Repeals and replaces Ordinance No. 354.
- Ordinance No. 672 Repeals Ordinance No. 362. Regarding the Aumsville Park and Recreation Commission (PARC).
- Ordinance No. 673 Repeals Ordinance No. 476 regarding the Aumsville Traffic and Safety Commission.
- Ordinance No. 674 regarding Municipal Sewer and Water Liens: Repeals Ordinance No. 365.
- Ordinance No. 675 Repeals Ordinance No. 543 regarding the Aumsville Skate Park Committee.
- Ordinance No. 676 Repeals Ordinance No. 544 regarding Property Owner Land Claims (Measure 37 Claims).
- Ordinance No. 677 regarding Public Contracting Regulations: Repeals and replaces Ordinance No. 559.
- Ordinance No. 678 regarding System Development Charges: Repeals and Replaces Ordinance No. 387.
- Ordinance No. 679 regarding Water Rates and Regulations: Repeals and Replaces Ordinance No. 401.
- Ordinance No. 680 regarding Sewer Use Charges: Repeals and Replaces Ordinance No. 402.

• Ordinance No. 681 regarding Sewer Regulations: Repeals and Replaces Ordinance No. 570.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: COVID-19: CA Harding updated Council on the COVID-19 epidemic. The Aumsville zip code area had a rise and we are now at 52 positive cases since the beginning of the outbreak.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES: Councilor Casarez gave a shout out to the many volunteers and sponsors that helped to make the recent fundraiser for the victims of the Santiam Canyon Fires a success. They were able to raise over \$5000 in relief funds.

Scott Lee asked about the stop sign on Del Mar Dr. and if it would ever be removed. CA Harding explained that there are several agencies involved in making that decision. It has been a very contentious issue regarding whether to abandon the railway or reactivate the line. Unless the line is officially abandoned, the stop sign will most likely stay in place.

Dayadevi Heart reported some bad dips in the road near the Del Mar Dr. and 1st St. intersection and asked if someone could check it. CA Harding stated that our engineer and Public Works staff just completed an extensive review of this area. We will be looking at partial redesign of several intersections and this is one of those. He will bring the report to Council once it is completed.

Councilor Casarez asked for an example of the cost of the railroad crossing upgrades that would have to be done if the railroad line is reactivated. CA Harding explained that ODOT Rail Division is requiring crossing arms at three locations in the city; Mill Cr. Rd, 1st St., and Del Mar Dr. He stated that it could be in excess of \$1.5 million to do all three crossings and a total project cost with the intersection improvement could be as high as \$7 million but developing a preliminary design will help us determine a good estimated cost.

It is an honor to have received the vote of the citizens of House District 19 to continue to represent you in the state legislature. In addition to meeting the needs of constituents as they



access state resources, I look forward to my ongoing work in health care, public safety, mental health, and education policy.

As you are reading this newsletter we are nearing the end of the "freeze" called by the Governor in mid-November to once again stem the tide of the spread of COVID19, as not to overwhelm our hospitals. It is yet to be determined if we are successful. We do know that some businesses were unable to stay afloat for a second, albeit shorter, shutdown. While not the outcome any of us desire it has become an all too common reality.

The wildfire recovery in the Santiam Canyon is ongoing. If FEMA and the state are on task they should be entering the ash and trash phase of clean-up. There is a weekly meeting of the Regional Solutions Team, specifically focused on the canyon which I attend. If you or someone you know is in need of assistance the SIT Team, a part of the Santiam Hospital is reliable resource. The stress and strains of the last 9 months have taken its toll on our children, our personal relationships, our workplaces, our friends and neighbors. The holidays can either lift us up and propel us on or cause us to sink further. Please know your mental health is just as important as your blood pressure.

December brings with it our final set of legislative days. These days are set aside for committee meetings where we receive reports and updates, as well as hear firsthand some of the potential legislation for the 2021 session. At this time the arrangements for the 2021 session are being designed with the health and safety of all participants in the forefront. I do know that the session needs to be open and accessible for all Oregonians. We must have a legislative session that is transparent. This means that the Capitol building is open for business, committee meetings are held in person and testimony can be given in person. We must ensure the public is part of the process in crafting legislation and that legislators have access

to one another. The average number of bills in a regular session has grown over the years as well as the complexity of the proposed legislation. The ability to truly understand bills, examine the merits and build consensus or not is essential. It cannot and should not be done virtually. I am hopeful that the leadership will keep these ideals in place as they finalize plans, and that I will be able to report to you in next month's publication.




Hello Aumsville. The below entry was drawn as the winner of this year's Holiday Cheer Award.
