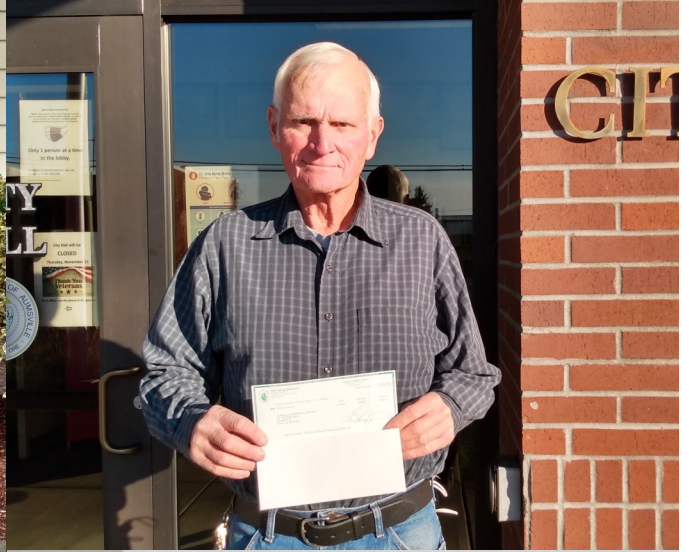

HOUSING NEEDS ANALYSIS PUBLIC MEETING

As part of the Housing Needs Analysis (HNA), the City of Aumsville would like to invite you to a Public Open House on **Tuesday, December 7th at 5:00 PM** to discuss the City's housing needs and provide feedback on the preliminary work. Specifically, we want to have a conversation regarding your opinion on needed housing types, barriers to housing, and what Aumsville can do better to ensure adequate housing is provided to those of all backgrounds and income levels. Input from Aumsville residents and business owners is critical to the HNA process and will help the project advisory committee evaluate suitable methods for meeting the identified needs.

Answers to some FAQs:

Where will the Open House be held?

- The open house will be held at Aumsville Community Center. COVID-19 protocols will be in place and occupancy will be limited.

Do I need to be knowledgeable about housing/planning to attend?

- Absolutely not! The goal of the open house is for staff to listen to the thoughts and ideas of the public.

If I cannot attend, can I still submit my thoughts and input?

- Yes! A survey is available at City Hall or online where you can help us fill in the needed information. In addition to the survey questions, we encourage you to add any additional comments you would like to submit.

CASCADE SCHOOL DISTRICT NEWS

For the first time in Cascade High School history, the volleyball team was crowned state champions. The Cougars capped off their historic season by beating Sisters in the state championship in five sets: 27-29, 25-17, 17-25, 25-18, 15-7.



Students, staff and community members made the journey to Corvallis to watch the state championship matchup and the Cougars did not disappoint bringing home the first volleyball title in school history.

“I am so proud to be a part of this community,” said Superintendent Darin Drill. “It felt like everyone in our district was in that gym. The energy was awesome and it was great to see all of the support.”

Also this month, the Cascade School District submitted its proposal for Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Three (ESSER III) funding.

Over the next three years, Cascade will receive \$4 million in funding from the ESSER program. The district has allocated \$1,075,000 for year one. This first portion of funds

will be used for the following:

- Extended hours for tutoring and after-school academic support
- Extended hours for summer enrichment/academic support
- Additional counseling and mentoring services for the most at-risk populations
- Transportation for after-school and summer programs
- Resources and materials for outdoor learning spaces at the elementary level
- Resources for community liaison and quarterly newsletters
- Staff mental health support and COVID related sick bank allowance
- District-wide experiential and CTE learning modules and opportunities
- Additional Chromebooks and "hotspots" for the most at-risk students
- Supplemental reading materials for K-5 special education

“This proposal was a collaborative effort between administrators, teachers and staff,” Drill explained. “This is going to make a tremendous impact for our students and staff for years to come.”

The district can begin spending the ESSER III funds immediately.

STATE SENATOR'S MESSAGE



As we head into the holiday season, the legislature is preparing for the 2022 short session. As Chair of the Senate Committee on Health Care, we are bringing forward two significant bills: one which will require insurance coverage of in-vitro fertilization to help people start families and one to establish a brain injury resource facilitation center to

assist people with brain injuries to receive the care they need.

As for my personal bills, I will be introducing a bill that assists folks living in affordable housing units that are being moved to market-rate to make sure they can afford to stay in their homes. My second bill will be creating an

online registry for community-based caregivers to make it easier to find qualified caregivers and ensure they can provide the care your family needs.

Although this newsletter will come out after Veterans Day, I do want to acknowledge the nearly 19 million veterans living in our country. Many veterans have struggled to find work, housing, or health care. We can do better in helping them. I'm learning in this work that there is no "one-size-fits-all" approach to any of our societal concerns – from finding suitable employment, to the shortage of affordable housing, to the need for more mental health services, and more. We need one another – and if there ever was a time when we needed to help each other and work together, it's now.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S MESSAGE



Friends –

We are entering the long dark days of winter and the last fleeting days of 2021. It has been another year of fighting COVID19. We have learned that life continues to move forward regardless

of our health, employment, or schooling. While our temporary circumstances are not ideal, I believe that our communities of HD19 have accomplished good outcomes and in some cases good progress addressing issues.

At my most recent listening session "Your District -Your Voice" I was able to share how I directed Local Community Investments (LCI) for the City of Aumsville and Turner. Each municipality received \$300,000 to put towards worthy projects that will benefit our communities for years to come. The City of Aumsville plans an upgrade to the water tower and park adjacent to City Hall, and the City of Turner plans to upgrade the bathrooms at the Burkland Pool. Two local non-profits managing the homeless crisis in Salem received \$150,000 for their efforts.

Numerous students from the Cascade School District are enrolled at the newly opened Willamette Career Academy – WCA – located on Lancaster Dr NE in Salem. WCA provides innovative programs to prepare high school students for high-wage, high-demand careers in Oregon. They too received LCI to help support the students enrolled in diesel technology, health services, and cosmetology. Class offerings for the 2022-23 school year will include manufacturing technology, computer science / information technology, and construction technology. This is the premier technical school for our students – tomorrow's business owners and leaders.

These four Local Community Investments in a time of continued distress helps all of us see the future more brightly, and in some instances will make the true difference in the lives of individual community members.

As a young mom I was always looking for activities, at little to no cost, for my children whenever school was out. If you are a parent looking for some daytime activities, please consider visiting your state Capitol the month of December. Once again "Holidays at the Capitol" will take place December 1-23 from 8AM-5PM. Holiday décor will be on display and you can take in the festive atmosphere and a little history while you visit! The Capitol is open and there is no fee, Oregon State Capitol, 900 Court Street, Salem 97301.

AUMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Aumsville has had several schools. There is very little information on the early ones. Locations are not specific. Perhaps this is because the settlement was very small and there were so few landmarks. Beginning about 1893 the school offered a year of high school in addition to the eight years of elementary school. There was no kindergarten in those days. It is recorded that in 1917, four years of high school were offered.

About 1922, the old school building was replaced by the Amos Davis School, which was on the north side of Main Street between 8th and 9th. It was named in honor of the same man for whom the city of Aumsville is named.

There was no high school graduating class in 1923. In 1924 there were nine graduates. In 1926 school bus service was begun for rural students and those from nearby communities. As enrollment increased, elementary grades were moved to a separate building and the school on Main Street became Aumsville High. At some unrecorded time, a teacher training program was established. It is not clear if the enrollees were seniors or if graduates returned for additional instruction. Practice teaching was done in the elementary school. Upon completion of the course, the newly minted teachers could accept teaching jobs.

AHS has recently received 28 framed high school graduating class photos. Actually, the frames for 1924 and '5 have no pictures, just names. There is no frame for 1926. The frames for 1927 through '50 contain individual photos of the graduates and their names. 1939 had a class of 32. There were only 10 in 1947, probably because many of the boys left school to join the military during WWII.

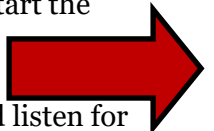

SANTA VISITS

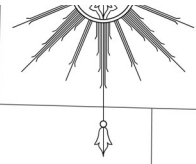

IN MEMORY OF MARK NOACK

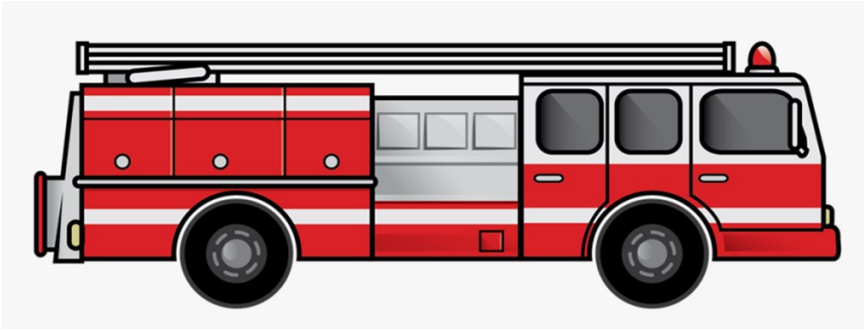

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

The following may not be complete minutes from these meetings. You can find the full approved minutes on our website at www.aumsville.us/city-council.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL

Minutes – October 11, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Present in person were Mayor Clevenger, Councilor Ceja, City Administrator Harding, and City Clerk Rogers. Councilors Casarez, Ecclestone, Seney, and Wick joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: Councilor Lee. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT:

There were no online attendees and no in-person attendees. There was no public comment. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

Council unanimously approved the September 27, 2021 Council meeting minutes.

CA Harding commented that he sent his written report out to Council prior to the meeting for review. He asked if Council had any questions about the report. There were no questions or discussion. The report will be posted on the city website with the meeting video and other packet materials.

Mayor Clevenger asked if there were any reports or initiatives from Council. There were none.

There being no further business or discussion Mayor Clevenger adjourned the meeting without prejudice at 7:03 PM

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL

Minutes – October 25, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Present in person were Mayor Clevenger, Councilor Ceja, City Administrator Harding, and Office Assistant Turpin. Councilors Casarez, Ecclestone, Lee, Seney, and Wick

joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: none. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

PRESENTATIONS: Cascade School District—State of the District by Darin Drill, Cyndi Ganfield, and Madeline Sattler.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT:

There was 1 online attendee and 1 in-person attendee. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

Matthew Conser, Conser Group, discussed the need for housing in the state. He discussed the history of his company and began to outline a proposed development in Aumsville. CA Harding asked that he not discuss his particular development but limit comments to changes he would like to see within the development code. CA Harding advised the best way to gauge Council's desire to make changes is to submit correspondence to Council about the changes in writing. It would then be up to Council to direct staff to work on any of the proposed changes should they so desire. This also provides documentation on the Council's process and interactions with a developer.

Council unanimously approved the October 25, 2021 Council meeting minutes.

Council reviewed an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) between the State of Oregon through the Department of Land Conservation (DLCDC) and City of Aumsville to provide technical assistance to update the joint interagency hazard mitigation plan. FEMA grant will fund DLCDC for this update. This plan is required by FEMA in order for the city to qualify for grant funds. We will not be required to put any funds towards this but will contribute staff time. Council unanimously voted to authorize the intergovernmental agreement between the State of Oregon and the City of Aumsville for technical hazard miti-

gation assistance under ORS 190.110.

Council discussed revenue from the Corn Festival and donating funds to the non-profits and service groups who assisted with the festival. Council unanimously approved Resolution 17-21 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY to Distribute Funds Donated and Raised by the Corn Festival Event to Local Community Groups providing Services within the City of Aumsville Service Area.

Council unanimously approved Resolution 18-21 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING 2021-2022 BUDGET AMENDMENT IN THE GENERAL FUND. (Corn Festival Donation Distribution)

Council unanimously approved Resolution 19-21 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING 2021-2022 BUDGET AMENDMENT IN THE GENERAL FUND. (T-Mobile & Pacific Power Foundation Grants)

Mayor Clevenger asked if there were any reports or initiatives from Council. There were none.

Council entered into a closed Executive Session at 7:55 PM

EXECUTIVE SESSION: The council met under the authority of: ORS 192-660(2)(e), to carry on negotiations under ORS chapter 293 deliberation with persons designated by the governing body to negotiate real property transactions; and (f) to consider information or records that are exempt by law from public inspection.

An executive session and the discussion are off the record, matters discussed are not to be disclosed. Mayor Clevenger closed the Executive Session at 8:06 PM.

Council reconvened the open session at 8:07 PM and announced that no decision was made and there was no further discussion. The meeting adjourned without prejudice at 8:07 PM.

MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN UPDATE

On August 3, 2021 Marion County is kicking off the update to the All-Hazard Mitigation Plan. Existing All-Hazard Mitigation Plans must be updated every five years.

Marion County is collaborating with the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development (DLCD) to update the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Plan to cover all hazards.

The updates will ensure the county, cities, and special districts maintain eligibility to apply for disaster related grant funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The plan will be completed by August, 2022.

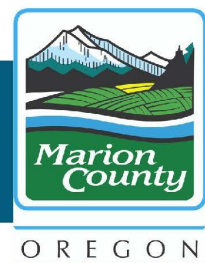

Aumsville October 2021 Monthly Police Report

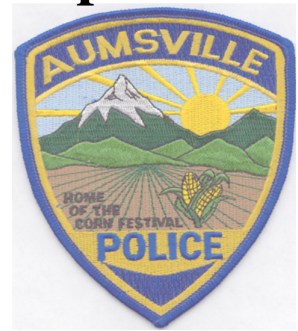
DEPARTMENT MESSAGE:

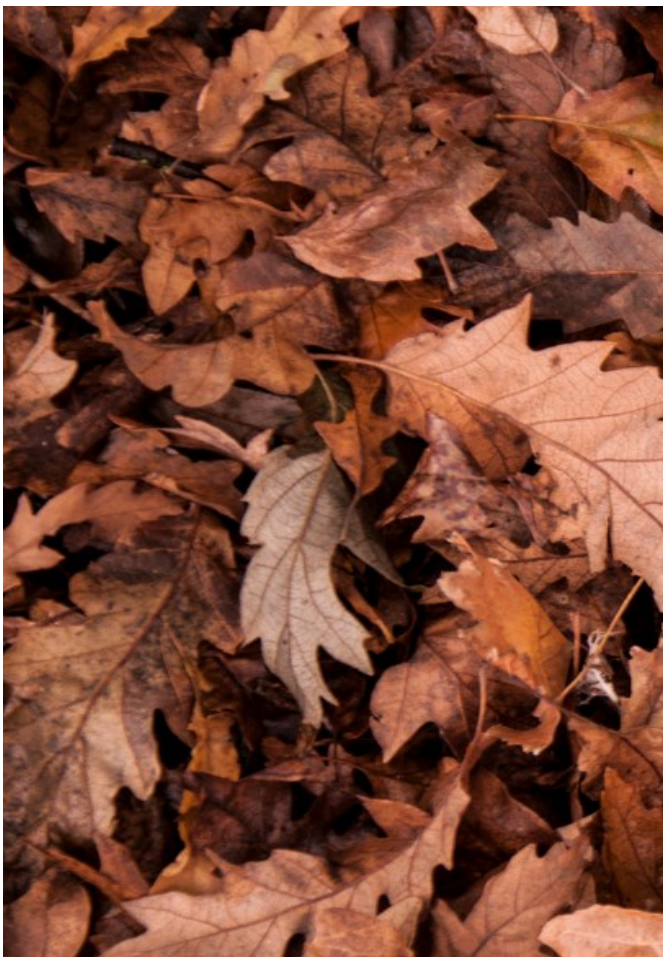
