Aumsville Historical Society News



On Saturday, October 8th, Turner Elementary School's Centennial was celebrated with a multifaceted event on the campus. There were self-guided tours of the buildings, an alumni gathering, student displays, a car show, food carts, vendors offering variety of items, games for youngsters, and community service booths. Aumsville Historical Society displayed its collection of Turner memorabilia at a table in the auditorium and many people stopped to chat about the items and share memories.

At 6 PM on Thursday, November 10th, AHS met in the community center. Refreshments were available at that time; that is casually known as "meet, greet and eat". President Ted Shepard presided over the business meeting. There were announcements and community updates. The annual election was held and these officers were re-elected: President Ted Shepard, Vice President Russ Snow, Secretary Diana Wullert, and Treasurer Linda Mills. Clara Bohanan was re-elected to a three-year term as a member of the Board of Directors. There are three directors; one seat is up for election every year.

The new lighting in the museum is greatly appreciated. More repair work is planned; the building is more than 110 years old. The Aumsville Police Department

donated Cascade High School annuals for 1982 and 1990. The school graciously donated a 2022 annual.

AHS will NOT meet in December. The city sponsors a number of holiday events. Everyone is encouraged to support them by volunteering their time. Good Day, neighbor!

Here we are in winter already, and it seems like summer was just yesterday. The Fire District will be hosting our annual Open House on December 10th from 5 pm to 9 pm. There will be sweets and treats at the station after Santa tours the town. We are also bringing back the bounce house along with some vendors.

The District Board is currently gathering input from architects, financial consultants, and our survey questions as we determine the next steps on upgrading our facilities. Work sessions are planned throughout the next few months as we determine our options on the building as well as replacing the Fire Chief who has indicated he will be leaving at the end of June.

This season brings with it the festivities of Christmas trees and lights. Please do your firefighters a huge favor by keeping your tree watered daily. Use only UL approved lighting installed per the manufacturer's instructions. Last, but certainly not least is use extreme caution whenever candles or other flame-producing devices are used. We don't want your holiday season to end in tragedy.

Cold weather often results in attempts to use heating devices that are not designed or approved for indoor use. These devices, while perhaps not a fire hazard, often

produce carbon monoxide (CO) gas as a byproduct of incomplete combustion. CO is odorless and tasteless, and it can rapidly displace oxygen in our red blood cells, leading to asphyxia. In my 40+ years as an EMT and Paramedic I have seen far too many tragic results of accidental CO poisoning. Always consider this when using any heat-producing appliance.

Don't forget to sand/de-ice your walkways! Hip injuries can be a life-changing event for elderly persons, and unfortunately, we see preventable slip-and-fall injuries every winter. Add a bag of deicer to your shopping list for your next run to the store!

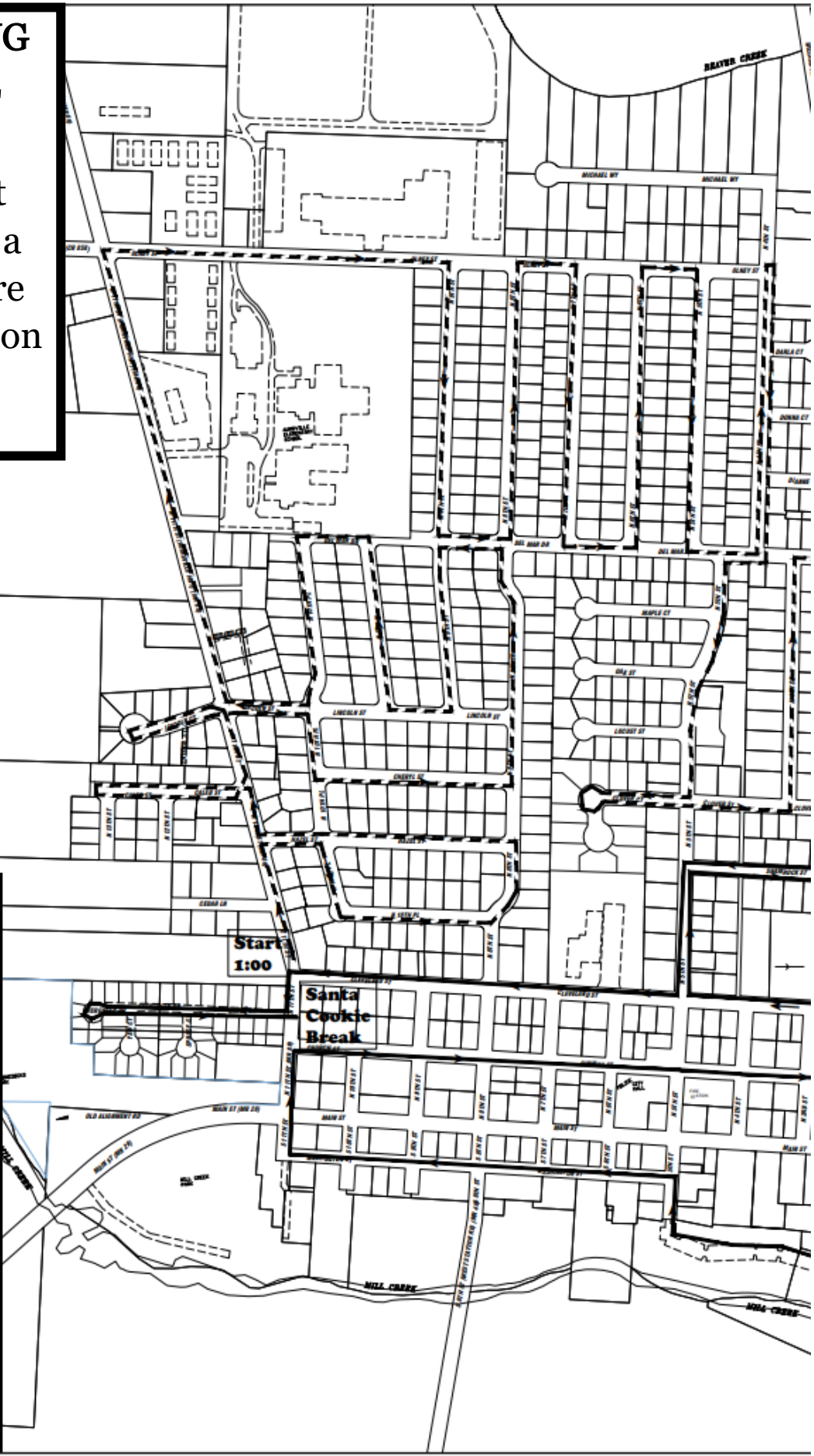

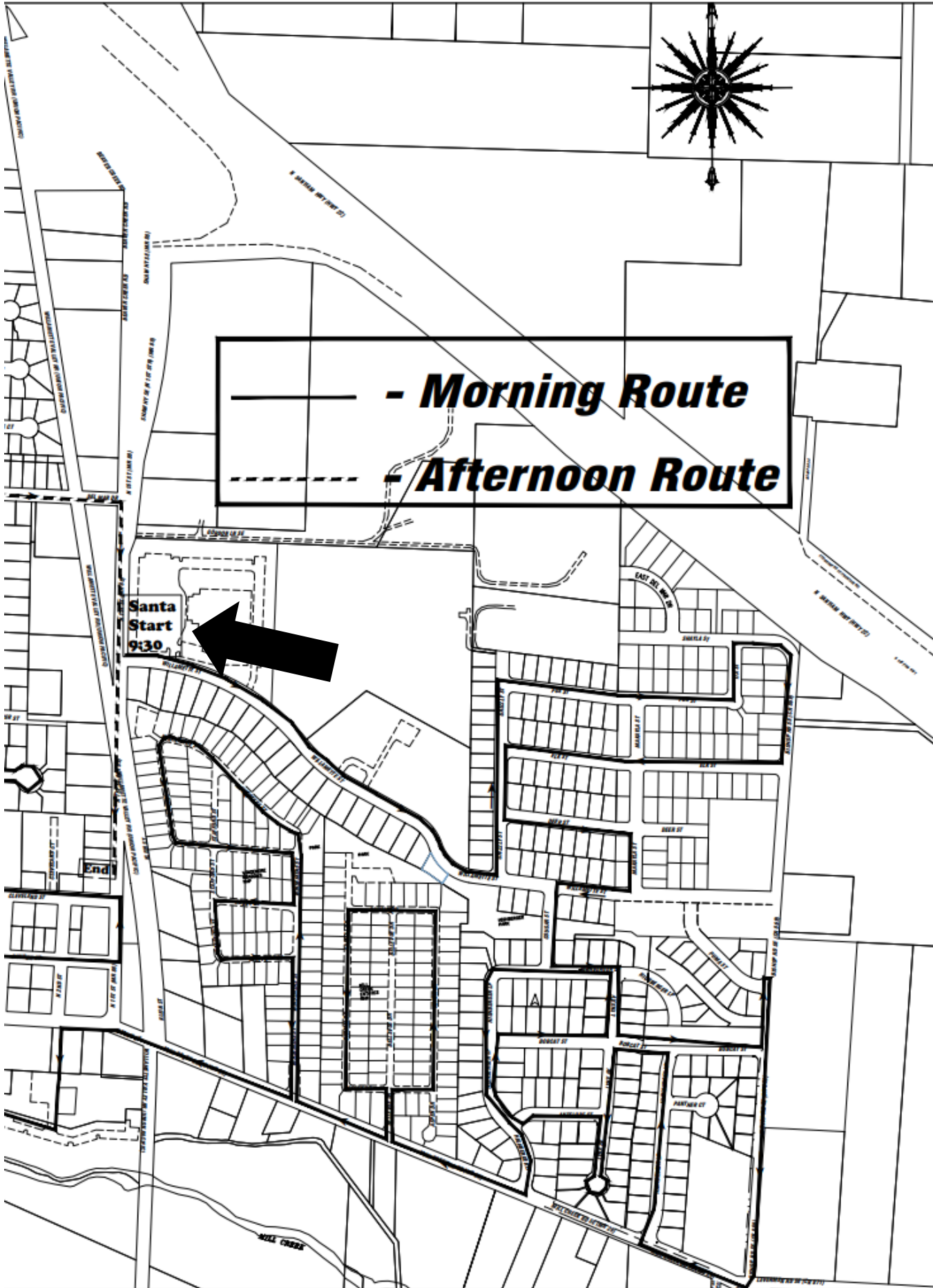

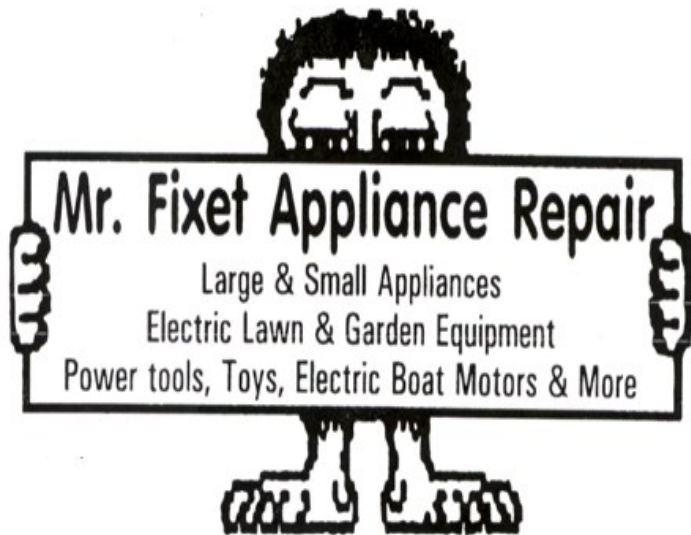

October 10, 2022 Meeting Highlights

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 PM. Present in-person were Councilors Ceja, Seney, Wick, and Mayor Clevenger. Staff present: City Administrator (CA) Harding, and City Clerk Rogers. Council via Zoom: Councilors Casarez and Lee. Council absent: None. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

AGENDA APPROVAL: Mayor Clevenger requested to move New Business Items 6A & B up to Item 3 and shift the balance of items down one. Council unanimously voted to approve the agenda as amended.

There were 17 in-person visitors and no online attendees. There was no public comment.

NEW BUSINESS: Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 13-22 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO DISTRIBUTE FUNDS DONATED AND RAISED BY THE CORN FESTIVAL EVENT TO LOCAL COMMUNITY GROUPS PROVIDING SERVICES WITHIN THE CITY OF AUMSVILLE SERVICE AREA.

PRESENTATION: Distribution of Corn Festival Funds

Representatives from the Aumsville Historical Society, Cascade School District, GSA Troop 31890, Mama's Community Market (food bank), Service Integration Team (SIT), and the Aumsville Exchange Club were present. Mayor Clevenger handed out the checks and gave each of them an opportunity to speak

about their groups. The mayor and CA Harding commended the groups for their dedication to our community. They thanked them for all their help at the Corn Festival and the service they give throughout the year, stating "We couldn't do all the wonderful events that we do without the help of all the dedicated volunteers."

PUBLIC HEARING: USDA Rural Development Loan and Grant Program Application

Mayor Clevenger opened the Public Hearing at 7:14 PM.

CA Harding gave a brief overview of the purpose of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) application. He stated that staff is diligently applying for grants to help offset the costs of necessary upgrades to our wastewater facility that the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) is requiring the city to make. The overall cost for this upgrade is estimated to be in the \$25M range. Over the last couple years, we have been awarded about \$8M in grants that will go to buying down the cost for potable water and wastewater projects. By approving the proposed resolution, Council will be authorizing the city to apply for grant funds, as well as a loan through the USDA. CA Harding stated that the city will have up to two years to enact the loan, giving us time to apply for grant funding to buy down the amount the city would need to finance, therefore, taking some of the burden off the citizens.

There was no public comments or testimony on the subject.

Mayor Clevenger closed the

public hearing at 7:20 PM.

There were no Council questions or deliberations. Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 14-22 A Resolution authorizing and providing for the incurrence of indebtedness for the purpose of providing a portion of the cost of acquiring, constructing, enlarging, improving, and/or extending its wastewater treatment facility with the change to line item #17 to read "To accept a grant in an amount not to exceed \$25,000,000" as presented by staff.

CA Harding reminded Council that on October 15th the city will host a fun community event. The Great Pumpkin Walk will be free to attend, and everyone present gets a free pumpkin to take home. There will also be free apple cider, donuts, and cookies for refreshments. The event will be from 1:00 PM to 4:00 PM at Maude's in Porter-Boone Park.

The meeting adjourned without prejudice at 7:27 PM.
