



STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S MESSAGE



Hello -

Last year at this time I wrote to you *"Spring is in the air…"* This year I think that spring is waiting for the rain to cease and the sun to heat us up!

Today I attended a meeting addressing the needs of rural

homelessness. It was a very interesting meeting and one of the most common causes for one to become homeless is due to the inability to pay rent. Easter Seals has a program that helps, the number to call is 503.587.7389.

Another interesting aspect of the homeless population in our region is that just over 50% of the homeless are women, the average is 29%. This is higher than average and creates the need for services that address the specific needs of women. Simonka Place for Women and Children, in Keizer, is one of the local shelters where homeless women, and if they have children, can seek services. They can be reached at 503.362.7487.

Additionally, my fellow legislators and I had a wildfire season briefing from the Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal and the Oregon Department of Forestry. While we have experienced higher than normal rain falls this spring we are still on heightened alert for fires this season. The record wet April and May, while welcome for our drought situation, has resulted in substantial undergrowth and light fuels as we head into summer. Many of you have yard debris piles that have been sitting waiting to dry for months. Keep in mind that these piles are no doubt surrounded by new growth that can result in unanticipated fire spread. As things dry out and we begin backyard burning, be sure to take all safety precautions necessary to prevent your fire from getting out of control.

Planning continues for the Administrative Office and living quarters replacement. Staff is working with architects to come up with a viable plan to be brought to public vote for bond funding. Our spring academy has resulted in the addition of 3 new volunteer Firefighters to our rolls, all local home responders. Two are EMTs, and the third will be shortly. An additional volunteer is also completing her EMT classes. As always, the Aumsville Fire District is seeking volunteers for many roles. If you know anyone who is looking for some excitement in their spare time, with the benefit of training for an excellent career, please direct them to our office!

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

The following may not be complete minutes from these meetings. You can find the full approved minutes on our website at www.aumsville.us/city-council.

April 11, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Present in-person were Mayor Clevenger and Councilors Casarez, Ecclestone, Seney, Wick, City Administrator (CA) Harding, and City Clerk Rogers. Councilor Lee joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: Angelica Ceja. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

Arbor Day Proclamation: Mayor Clevenger read into record proclaiming April 29th, 2022 as Arbor Day, urging all citizens to plant and care for trees to gladden the heart and promote the well -being of this and future generations.

Visitors: There were no online attendees and one in-person attendee. No public comment.

PUBLIC HEARING: Supplemental 2021-2022 Budget Amendment – FEMA Grant

The Public Hearing opened at 7:03 PM.

CA Harding reported that the City was awarded a grant from FEMA to help recover costs incurred by the February 2021 ice storm. At the time the current fiscal year budget was adopted, the city was unsure of the total amount, if any, that would be received from FEMA. In total, grant DR4599 has provided a total of \$65,313.72 in recovery funding, a 75% match for claimed resources spent in emergency management and cleanup of debris.

Staff requested authorization to process various budget amendments to appropriate FEMA Grant resources and approve Resolution No. 04-22 under New Business.

There was no testimony, rebuttal, or questions from Council. The Public Hearing closed at 7:05 PM. There were no further deliberations.

NEW BUSINESS: Council reviewed and approved Resolution No. 04-22 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING 2021-2022 BUDGET AMENDMENT IN THE GENERAL FUND.

Council moved to direct staff to reclassify \$15,000 of budgeted revenue from the City Reserve, Miscellaneous Income line to the new FEMA DR4599 Reimbursement line. The motion was unanimously approved. Council reviewed the Business Oregon Grant for \$2,500,000 to be used to help build a new 1-million-gallon water reservoir and drill two new wells within the city. Council unanimously approved Authorizing City Administrator Harding to sign the grant contract, number SR2229, with Business Oregon for receipt of Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds in the amount of \$2,500,000.

City Administrator Report: CA Harding is still working with Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) on the Wastewater Facility Plan approval to work through some issues in order to get the process pushed through to take advantage of the current funding opportunity environment.

CA Harding updated Council on the Corn Festival planning. He asked them to help pick a parade theme. Staff narrowed the choices down to two: "Once Upon a Corn Stalk" or "Who Ya Gonna Call? Corn Huskers!" After a short discussion, Council consensus was to go with "Who Ya Gonna Call? Corn Huskers!"

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES: Councilor Seney reported that the Mid-Willamette Valley Transportation Commission has 39% more funds for transportation projects that will be going to cities and counties. They are in the process of deciding how they are going to distribute the funds. Council revisited crosswalks on 11th Street. CA Harding will continue to work with Marion County on this subject.

The meeting adjourned at 7:22 PM.

April 25, 2022 Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order at 7:04 PM. Present in-person were Councilors Ceja, Ecclestone, Seney, Wick, and City Administrator (CA) Harding and City Clerk Rogers. Councilor Lee and Casarez joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: Mayor Clevenger. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

<u>Visitors:</u> There was one in-person visitor and no online attendees.

Public Comment: A resident of Aumsville informed Council that he recently stopped at the post office after

hours and found a man sleeping inside the lobby area. He asked if the Aumsville Police could stop by the post office occasionally just to do a safety/ welfare check. His concern was for the person's health and safety, and for others that stop to get their mail.

NEW BUSINESS: Water/Sewer Rates Discussion

CA Harding gave an overview of the 2022-2023 Budget in regard to the upcoming annual water and sewer rate increase. He talked about the current rate of inflation and how it could affect the cost of city water and sewer operations. Using the city's forecasting model, he showed Council that we could see up to a 4% increase in water and 8% in sewer operation costs. Council discussed how these increases will add further burden to our residents who are already feeling it at the gas pumps, grocery store, and other utilities. CA Harding offered some options for Council to consider but warned there are some risks that would be involved. By deferring a \$100,000 transfer into the Water Improvement Fund, we could sustain with only the annual increase of 3%. He explained that our overall budget is in good shape, and we could delay the higher increases this year, but that will only make the inevitable increase higher down the road. This would give some relief to residents at the peak of the current inflation. After a lengthy discussion Council consensus was to do the annual 3% increase, and defer the \$100,000 for this year, effective June 1st, 2022. CA Harding will prepare a resolution and bring it to the next Council meeting on May 9, 2022.

City Administrator Report: CA Harding reported that staff has been discussing COLA increases. Taking into consideration the CPI is close to 8%, city employees are willing to settle for a 6% COLA for the upcoming budget year. After a brief discussion, Council agreed with the 6% and directed staff to figure the 6% COLA into the budget.

GOOD OF THE ORDER: Councilor Seney reported that she has heard a lot of positive comments about the Easter Egg Hunt event.

The meeting adjourned at 8:12 PM.

Aumsville Elementary School Has a New Principal

Cascade School District Superintendent Darin Drill announced that Zach Mintzer will be the new principal at Aumsville Elementary School. Mintzer replaces Cyndi Ganfield who accepted the principal's job at Terrebonne Community School in the Redmond School District.

"Zach [Mintzer] is the perfect choice for this role," said Superintendent Darin Drill. "He is a great leader in our district and cares about every person

Aumsville. He had a great mentor in Cyndi [Ganfield], and I think he will continue to promote a culture of hard work, growth and compassion."

Mintzer has been the assistant principal at Aumsville Elementary since 2019. Before that, he taught social studies at Cascade High School. Mintzer grew up in the Cascade School District and attended Aumsville He Elementary. graduated from Cascade High School in 2006.

"It's super meaningful because I went to this school," Mintzer said. "We want Aumsville to be an anchor in the community for our students, staff and families. Our focus will be on building a culture where kids want to run into the school, not away from school and where everyone feels welcome."

During May, Aumsville third, fourth and fifth graders took field trips to Cascade High School to participate in

various vocational activities. Fourthgrade students learned about plant science from Cascade High School agriculture students and they got to plant dahlias. Third graders took a trip to the manufacturing class and made a project using the plasma cutter.

Students from all three grades attended agricultural safety day at the high school and learned about



water safety to outdoor survival to fire safety and more.

"Anytime we can get students doing something experiential, you see that translate positively to the classroom," added Mintzer. "Instilling that love for learning at a young age - whether it's manufacturing, art, plant science, reading, math or something else means we are educating the whole child."



The Aumsville City Council is pleased to present these budget highlights for the community. The entire budget follows, so our community can look over the budget details. Our hope is this page will provide a quick snapshot of important pieces of our budget. There are lots of exciting things going on in the city and our community has a lot to be proud of.

2022-2023 Budget = \$18,383,969 \$946,000 from property taxes

This budget shows the value in maintaining an active, healthy financial position. The budget committee continues to make prudent and conservative choices. We want to thank them for their work; in just a couple of years we have made remarkable progress.

In this year's budget you will see some familiar projects as some of them will take multiple years to complete. It also good to continue to remind the community of our challenges and how they may impact you in the future.

The city's financial position continues to improve although events like COVID-19, natural disasters like the Ice storms and even the historical inflation have impacts that can move the city's financial position up or down. We weather those events by being proactive in managing long term forecasts and good financial policies which leads to sound financial planning. This year our community is faced with unprecedented inflation which cause great strain on all of us. The City council is mindful not only about the needs of the City as a whole but the needs of individuals with our community. They are pausing some financial planning policies that would raise utility rates consistent with the rate of inflation for now. This new policy could not be sustained long term but it may help provide some relief for residents in the short term. We have a lot to do and many challenges ahead but we're working to meet those challenges.

GENERAL FUND - BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The budget estimates General Fund resources of \$2,420,973.

The general fund is our most flexible pool of resources. Transfers from this fund help support police and park services as well as special projects to meet the city council's goals for our community. The revenues are made of property taxes, fees for services provided by the city, franchise agreements, and new construction permits. Special projects to implement the city's vision are all included in this general fund budget. The city will maintain a 90-day cash reserve and continue to meet the expectations of our community.

New Public Works Facility

Our Public Works department provides key services that touches a part of everything we do. they maintain streets, stormwater, water, sewer and Parks. Public Works also coordinates permits, code enforcement and is the foundation behind all community events. It has been difficult to complete all of these tasks and projects and remain effective from the current shop buildings. The city received a \$900,000 Grant to help fund the new building. The building will be located in the industrial area next to Blazer Industries.



COVID-19



The City dedicates all of its received property tax revenue and the public safety fee revenue to maintaining our police protection. Continuing to protect and serve the Aumsville community.

A priority for our city is to continue the tradition of hosting great community events for the entire family. With the urgent threat of COVID behind us we can again focus on creating a healthy community by bring our residents together for these celebrations.

CHALLENGES

We have major water and wastewater projects on the horizon.





We need to address stormwater.

We were able to secure almost \$4 million dollars in grant funding to build a new water reservoir and two new drinking water wells. This grant alone would have cost an additional \$20.00 per month in increased utility rates but the grant allows this improvement with no additional cost to our utility customers.

We have completed a stream study and are working on the initial engineering report for our wastewater treatment system. Currently we are under an order with DEQ because our system releases too much ammonia. To fix this, we'll need to build a mechanical plant which will cost between \$21-23 Million.

We received a grant to install a veterans' memorial at City Hall. The selection includes a diverse group of children pledging allegiance to the American flag. The memorial will honor all of those who have served, are serving and will serve to support our country.

The city financials are stable and sustainable. The city has been working hard to acquire grants to fund required projects, to provide critical services and enhance the community. We have received over \$6.5 million dollars in grants over the past year and a half. These grants have been essential in making many of these improvements possible. Most of these projects will take multiple years to complete.

Who could give additional information? Terry Snyder! So, he


