

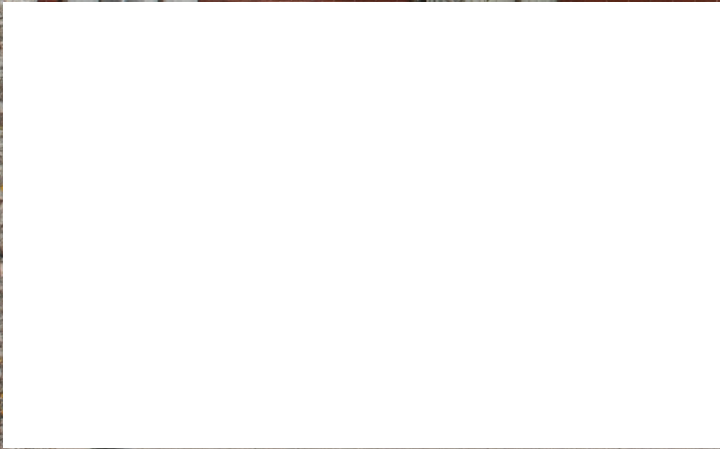

PARADE RULES

- CANDY:** If you throw candy to the crowd, please throw it at the feet of the crowd and not over their heads.
- No alcoholic beverages will be allowed on or in any entry vehicles, and no consumption of alcohol by parade participants will be allowed prior to or during the parade.
- No entries, which are offensive or discriminatory to any race, religion, and ethnic or minority group, will be allowed.
- All advertising on entries shall be tasteful and subordinate to the theme of the Corn Festival.
- Any special distribution of material by entrants **MUST** have prior approval of the city administrator.
- All motorized entries must have liability insurance coverage in force, be properly licensed vehicles and be driven by a licensed driver.
- Any entrant or participant may be denied a parade registration or removed from the parade line-up if they

do not comply with the parade rules and regulations or violates any state, federal, or local laws and ordinances.

8. We need motorized vehicles to keep up with the pace of the parade. We want to avoid “gaps” in parade line-up.

Judges will look for decorations, cleanliness and neatness of the entrants, their accessories and/or livestock; as it applies to the theme. They will look for matching and/or coordinating outfits in group categories or floats and the use of the theme generally. They judge effort displayed in preparation of costumes and accessories.

CASCADE SCHOOL DISTRICT

Election results for Cascade School District's \$56.3 million bond measure indicate a narrow loss.

"While we are disappointed by the results, we are committed to engaging with our community and making decisions that reflect their values and wishes," said School Board Chair Brett Stegall. "We will continue to connect with our families and our community with the hope that one day, they feel comfortable investing in education."

The proposed bond measure was developed in collaboration with parents, community members and staff members after a comprehensive facility needs assessment was conducted. This group reviewed the needs of the district and developed the bond package designed to address health, safety and security concerns; community growth and overcrowding; critical repairs and upgrades; and support student career pathways. The bond would have targeted the greatest needs at each school in the district with an overall tax increase of 92 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value.

"The needs in our district still exist," explained Cascade School District Superintendent Darin Drill. "Capital construction projects are not funded by the state school fund. As we seek to prioritize student learning with general fund dollars, the district must now seek ways to address this growing list of concerns and maintain our community's assets for years to come."

In other district news, Superintendent Drill announced in May that Debbie LeDay will be the principal at Cascade Junior High beginning in the 2021-22 school year.

LeDay is currently working as an assistant principal at Cascade Junior High and is the district's Director of Federal Programs. She has been an administrator in the junior high school since 2017. LeDay replaces Pete Rasmussen who will be the next Cascade High School Principal. LeDay begins her new position on August 1.

"I'm really excited about this opportunity moving forward," said LeDay. "I had a great mentor in Pete [Rasmussen] and I will use everything he taught me to take on this new role."

The district is also in the process of taking applications for a school board position vacated by board member, Dan Van De Hey. Applicants must be registered voters and must have resided in the district for one year prior to the date of the appointment. The appointed director shall serve until June 30, 2023. The appointee may choose to file for election in the Spring of 2023 for the May 2023 general election. The full term length for Position 2 is four years.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT



Friends –
It is May 16th as I compose this monthly update. A week ago, it looked like the state was headed for another extended shutdown due to the increased number of Oregonians hospitalized because of COVID. We

learned late Thursday the 13th, that the CDC, in light of the number of people who have been vaccinated, has adjusted the recommendations on the wearing of masks and social distancing and the Governor has adopted them for Oregonians as well. My hope, as you read this update, is that we are on track for ensuring Oregonians get back to work, all school districts have students in school five days a week in the fall, and our local public health authorities have the support they need to continue to help normalize life with a new virus.

My colleagues and I from across the state and up and down the I-5 corridor are hearing from business owners unable to fill positions initially left vacant from the shutdown and are now once again thriving and need employees. One such employer called my office the other day and shared: *"I cannot find people who want to work. I pay a competitive rate of \$53,000 per year, and I am unable to find people willing to come off of unemployment and return to the workforce."*

With the easing of workplace restrictions, we will more than likely have conversations around how best to help people get back to work. Knowing that having a job not only provides the resources for food and shelter, but perhaps at a more fundamental level – it gives us purpose. Business owners looking to staff their workforce need all of us to help get Oregon rolling again.

As we head to the end of the 2021 Legislative session, I will make sure that budgets are passed that support education, wildfire relief, and ensure that our small businesses - from restaurants to childcare - have the incentives necessary to fully engage their clientele. Additionally, I have heard from hundreds of constituents throughout the district that the restrictions put in place by the Governor's Executive Orders need to be fully rescinded. This is just a short list of the issues that will keep me busy the last weeks of session. It is an honor to serve as your representative in HD19.

In the interim if we can be of help to you as you navigate your state government please call or email. My door is always open and my staff, Pam McClain, Lena Prine, and I welcome your participation. **As your state representative, I am here to listen, respond, and lead.**

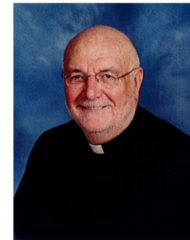

AUMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

An Aumsville Historical Society member has recently discovered several 1926 wheat harvest photos taken near the South Fork of the Snake River in south eastern Idaho. Harvesting was a very laborious job. Horse-drawn reapers cut the stalks and loose bundles were ejected onto the ground. These were transported to a thresher, which was attached to a heavy, wood-burning machine by cycling belts. The belts shook interior thresher trays to separate the grain from the straw. The straw was blown onto the ground.



The grain was sacked; the sacks were sewn shut and stacked. Loads of full sacks were placed on low transporters, each pulled by four horses. The loads were taken over Pine Creek Pass to the small settlement of Victor, which is very close to the Wyoming border. Part-way down the trail, there was a feed station where drivers and horses could eat and rest before continuing in either direction. There was snow on the mountainsides and sometimes underfoot.

Victor seems to have been an odd destination. It did not have a mill, rail service or water transport, so it seems that the grain had not yet reached the end of its journey. This may be the reason that long-term grain production did not flourish in the area. By comparison, Aumsville, had a water powered mill and a railroad spur for distant transport of grain and flour.

Recently John Hortsch passed away. In years past, he and his late wife Edna were active walkers. They were often seen on the nearby roads, picking up litter along the way. AHS extends it sympathy to the family.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

The following may not be complete minutes from these meetings. You can find the full approved minutes on our website at www.aumsville.us/city-council.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL Minutes – April 12, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:01 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger, Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Lee, Seney, and Wick. Council absent: none. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding) and City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present via Zoom. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

Budget Committee Appointment -

Council unanimously appointed Katie Wallace to the Aumsville Budget Committee. Councilor Wick seconded

Arbor Day Proclamation - Mayor Clevenger read into the record a proclamation proclaiming April 30th, 2021 as Arbor Day. The proclamation is part of our Tree City program. Staff are putting together a video about the proper way to plant a tree and researching some possible free tree seedlings that could be given out to residents that want them.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT:

There were three online attendees and no public comment. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

PUBLIC HEARING: Aumsville Development Code Update Ord. No. 703

Mayor Clevenger opened the Public Hearing at 7:07 PM.

Staff Report: CA Harding explained that the updates are mostly for clarity and scrivener error correction. He went through the staff report and pointed out some of the changes.

Mayor Clevenger called for general testimony and there was none. He then called for questions from Council and there were no questions.

Mayor Clevenger closed the public hearing at 7:15 PM.

There was no Council deliberation and Mayor Clevenger called for a motion. Council unanimously approved the first reading by title only of Ordinance No. 703 repealing and replacing Ordinance

No. 670 as presented, adopting findings contained in the staff report.

Mayor Clevenger stated that with a unanimous passing of the first reading of Ord. No. 703, Council may choose to do a second reading and adoption at this same meeting. Council Unanimously approved the second reading by title only and adopted Ordinance No. 703 repealing and replacing Ordinance No. 670 as presented, adopting findings contained in the staff report.

OLD BUSINESS: Council reviewed an agreement with the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments (MVCOG) for the Aumsville Residential Building Land Inventory and Parks Master Plan Update. CA Harding explained that this agreement is for putting together the information needed to apply for expansion of the city's Urban Growth Boundary (UGB). This would also allow the City to apply to bring our recently acquired 23 acre park property into the UGB so we can begin the process of annexing it into the city limits. Council unanimously voted to authorize CA Harding to enter into an agreement with MVCOG for contract services for UGB expansion as well as buildable lands inventory as presented.

NEW BUSINESS: Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 03-21 A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE CHANGE OF INDIRECT CONTROL OF THE FRANCHISEE UNDER THE CABLE TELEVISION FRANCHISE.

Mayor Clevenger introduced Resolution No. 04-21 A Resolution in support of congressional appropriations for wastewater facility. CA Harding explained that this is basically a resolution for Council acknowledging the ask for Congressman Schrader, Senator Wyden, and Senator Merkley to work together to assist the City with federal funding to pay for the 10-15 million dollars of capital expenditure needed to build a new mechanical wastewater facility. He cited the process for the City to get direct appropriations from federal funding. This is a longshot and may not come through. There was no discussion. Council unanimously approved Resolution No.

04-21 A RESOLUTION TO SUPPORT FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE CITY OF AUMSVILLE WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITY.

CA Harding reported that there have been 272 COVID-19 cases accumulative in our zip code since the onset. He commented that the cases are along trends with other cities.

The event committee has met and are working on the details of upcoming events. We focused mainly on the Corn Festival and getting things lined up. The festival will be on August 21st this year. The theme that the committee is recommending is "All Dressed Up and Nowhere to Grow" playing off of COVID-19 restrictions. The dog park is scheduled for mid-May for fencing to be installed. The wheelchair swing will be installed in Wildwood Park.

We have everything together to complete the community center kitchen. Council gave consensus for CA Harding to go forward with the remodel.

Our parks took a beating this year and they will need some sprucing up. The parks are open, but there is still a lot of clean up needed.

CA Harding stated that with the Public Works staff workload and the pending addition of a new wastewater treatment facility as well as the new east side park, there will be a need to look at adding another staff person. Council consensus was for CA Harding to present this through the budget process.

Councilor Casarez thanked City staff for all their efforts to make the Easter event a huge success. He stated that he got a lot of good feedback from citizens.

Mayor Clevenger discussed his work travel itinerary with Council. The meeting adjourned without prejudice at 7:56 PM

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL
Minutes – April 26, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present were Councilors Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Lee, Seney, and Wick. Council absent: Mayor Clevenger

er. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding) and City Colleen Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present via Zoom. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT: There were three online attendees and one person had public comment. Kathy Mandyk inquired about the Aumsville Ponds and commented that the park is in bad condition and wanted to know when it would be cleaned up. CA Harding explained that this park is managed by Marion County Public Works and that he would contact them and inform them of her concerns.

NEW BUSINESS: Council reviewed and unanimously approved:

- Resolution No. 05-21 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING 2020-2021 BUDGET APPROPRIATION TRANSFERS IN THE WATER AND SEWER FUNDS. We do this just before budget season and it is basically internal fund transfers that are appropriated through our budget process.
- Resolution No. 06-21 A RESOLUTION AMENDING THE TRANSPORTATION CIP WITHOUT CHANGING METHODOLOGY OR

TSDC RATE. CA Harding stated that this resolution would add the Del Mar west intersection design for the project to the System Development Charge project list.

Right-of-Way Encroachments – Discussion

The City has codes that protect right-of-way (ROW) easements dedicated for public use. Recently we have implemented a Type A Permit that is required for all fences and sheds. He stated that in the older neighborhoods the streets were constructed narrower, putting the ROWs on the property side of the sidewalk in the front yards. CA Harding said that many sidewalks are only 3 feet wide and if you have a car parked against the curb with mirrors or accessories sticking out and then a fence against the sidewalk you end up leaving a narrow space. Our insurance carrier requires us to maintain 44 inches of clearance for ADA access as an example. After a lengthy discussion it was Council consensus that staff continue to follow and implement the City code as written and not allow fences to be built in the ROW area.

City Administrator Report: CA Harding reported that there have been 280

COVID-19 cases accumulative in our zip code since the onset. Summer event planning continues, with a focus on the Corn Festival. CA Harding stated that most events should be able to be conducted even with this restriction change. We will adjust to meet whatever the guidelines are at the time of each event.

CA Harding stated that he and our elected officials continue to lobby Representatives and reach out for assistance for funding our wastewater treatment facility upgrade.

Staff is working on the final wrap up of the budget documents in preparation for the upcoming Budget Committee sessions. He stated that the budget looks good, the same as last year. We were able to weather ice storms, floods, wildfires, and COVID and still stay within our budget.

Councilor Ceja inquired about when Council could possibly be meeting in person again. CA Harding estimated the middle of August pending any additional restrictions by the state.

The meeting adjourned without prejudice at 7:56 PM

DITCH DUMPING

We are once again running into the issue of people dumping soil, rocks, grass and other yard debris along the stream and ditch banks. This is not only a city violation, it will also get you in trouble with the state.

DEQ statutes follow:

ORS 468B.025(1)(a): Causing pollution of waters of the state or causing any wastes to be placed in a location where such wastes are likely to be carried to waters of the state by any means. Causing pollution to the waters of the state is a Class I violation. Placing wastes or causing any wastes to be placed in a location where such wastes are likely to be carried to waters of the state by any means is a Class II violation.

A mandate has been given to the city to make sure that our stormwater is as clean as possible to prevent contaminates such as mercury, bacteria, and increased temperature so that it does not hurt water quality in our streams. This mandate comes in the form of a Total Mass Daily Load (TMDL) re-



quirement from DEQ. This requires the city to take action to prevent water quality problems.

Bacteria: Placing grass and other yard debris along a waterway will cause water contamination by the grass decomposing and water washing the bacteria into the waterway. Animal waste, whether from dogs, cats, or chickens are another source of bacteria. Also, grass and yard debris are washed downstream during high water events.

Mercury: Mercury is present in the soil. Soil disturbances cause the leaching of mercury and sediments into the waterway. This is why you see erosion control fencing around work sites.

Temperature: Tree planting helps keep the streams cooler, but decaying yard debris warms runoff before it reaches the waterway. Trees planted along the banks are good to prevent erosion. Trees growing in the bottom of the waterway catch debris and cause flooding issues.

The city also has rules about discharging or water running into waterways. We will be contacting residents along our waterways to make sure contamination does not continue.

2021-2022 Budget = \$12,104,920
\$896,000 from property taxes

This budget shows the value in maintaining an active, healthy financial position. The budget committee continues to make prudent and conservative choices. We want to thank them for their work; in just a couple of years we have made remarkable progress.

The city's financial position has gradually improved over the past three years, allowing us to focus on community projects, like the dog park and wheelchair park equipment. It's also positioning the city to complete much needed infrastructure projects like an emergency generator for our water system. We have a lot to do and many challenges ahead but we're working to meet those challenges.

GENERAL FUND

The budget estimates General Fund resources of \$2,232,918.

The general fund is our most flexible pool of resources. Transfers from this fund help support police and park services as well as special projects to meet the city council's goals for our community. The revenues are made of property taxes, fees for services provided by the city, franchise agreements, and new construction. Special projects like completing our small village to grow Saturday Market, enhancing community events, and continuing to implement the city's vision are all included in this general fund budget. The city will maintain a 90-day cash reserve and continue to meet the expectations of our community.

SATURDAY MARKET



Saturday Market is expanding this year to occur every Saturday, starting in June and going until mid-September. We have already seen increased vendor excitement with this change.

The Tiny Village has building permits approved, and the groundwork and forms ready for concrete. We will be starting construction soon. The project is funded by a grant from Marion County and will help us build on our Saturday Market.

COMMUNITY CENTER KITCHEN

We are in the process of updating the community center kitchen. We received a small grant from Pacific Power Foundation, and the remainder of the costs will come from the building maintenance fund. The project is budgeted to cost approximately \$32,000.



COVID-19



The City dedicates property tax revenue and the public safety fee revenue to maintaining 24-hour police protection.

The city was able to support local business with \$50,000 in hassle free grants. Working with the fire district, staff, the community, and local businesses we have managed our COVID pandemic response as well as most communities.



The city council and staff maintained safe community events throughout the year. Based on restrictions by the Governor's office, we were required to cancel some events. We still produced Saturday Market, the Summer Children's Program, Movies in the Park, Easter Parade, a virtual Tree Lighting, Santa Visits and, don't forget, our Great Corn Giveaway and scavenger hunt.



ROADWORK



Del Mar intersection design. The city council has approved having both Del Mar east and west intersections designed. The design will show the improvement details and help identify how much each project will cost. This map shows the two intersections indicated by the circles and the transportation improvements memorialized in our transportation plan, showing the street connection east to west.

SUMMARY



The city financials are stable and sustainable. We move forward with good systematic controls on expenditures based on our current levels of service and inflation policies. The financial policies implemented in 2016 – 2017 have allowed the city to provide comprehensive services to the community without interruption. Flooding, wildfires, ice storms, and a worldwide pandemic all had impacts on our residents, businesses, and government last year. The city was able to weather those events well and continue to help and serve the community.

We are installing accessible playground equipment.

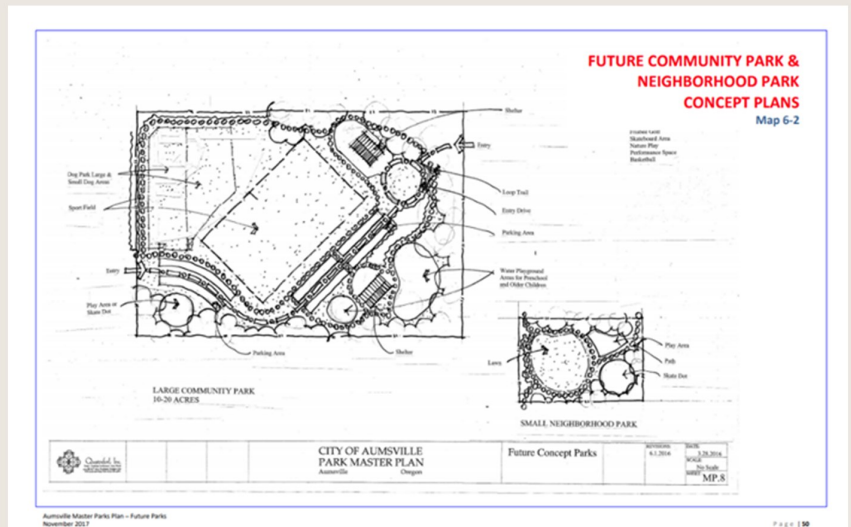


The city is developing a Community Art Program.

STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN ACTIVITIES and SOURCES OF FINANCING

Personal Services includes step plan adjustments for multiple positions, a 2% cost of living adjustment (COLA), and city-paid medical insurance premium increases January 2022. Collections include utility rate increases to take effect June 1, 2021; 3% in both Water and Sewer Funds. The Police Fund is experiencing between 5% and 10% increases in regional dispatch and records management services. The Park Fund is proposed to receive all of the State Revenue Sharing Apportionment this year, as well as a General Fund transfer to help support park maintenance costs. A General Fund transfer to the Investing In Aumsville Families & Children Fund is proposed to continue the youth programs for the year. In the System Development Charge (SDC) Funds, no EDU's are estimated to be submitted for permits during the coming fiscal year, as the available buildable lands continue to proceed through the site development review and planning process. The City is pursuing a \$13,000 Oregon Parks & Recreation Department grant to aid in design of the Eastside park.

WILDFIRE PREPARATION

Recognize Warning and Alerts

- Sign up for community alerts on the City's website. We use Everbridge alert system. <https://www.aumsville.us/police/page/emergency-preparedness>
- Activate Wireless Emergency Alerts on your phone, some mobile services call these messages Government Alerts. Read your phone's user manual for more information.



Make an Emergency Plan

- Make sure that everyone in your household knows what to do if you need to evacuate.
- Know the evacuation routes around your home/work.
- Make plans for your children/pets if they are home and you are at work.
- If you, or a loved one, has mobility issues or has a medical device which requires electricity, sign up for our Vulnerable Population Registry. <https://www.aumsville.us/police/webform/vulnerable-population-registry>

Strengthen your Home

- Use fire-resistant materials where possible.
- Create a fire-resistant zone that is free of leaves, debris, or flammable materials for 30 feet around your home.
- Designate a room which can be closed off from outside air. Close the windows and doors and set up a portable air cleaner when the air outside is smoky.

Review Important Documents

- Talk to your insurance agent to make sure your home/vehicle/property is protected. A lot of people find that their home is underinsured and after a loss they are financially unable to rebuild.
- Make digital copies of important documents and keep them in a secured, password protected, digital space. There are several cloud services like Google Drive or Drop Box which allow for this type of storage.

Gather Supplies

- Have enough household supplies including medication, first aid, pet supplies and masks in your go bag or trunk of your vehicle.
- Keep your cell phone charged. Purchase backup charge banks for charging these devices.

- A respirator, like an N95 respirator, can help keep out smoke particles. These may be difficult to find and do not fit children.

Staying Safe During Evacuation

- Evacuate immediately when authorities tell you to do so.
- If you do not have a location to evacuate to, check with the Red Cross for a public shelter.
- If you are trapped and unable to evacuate, call 911 and alert them to your location.
- Pay attention to the emergency alerts and notifications. There may be routes closed and you will want to follow their instructions.
