A Tour at Blazers Industries



If you had to guess which business in Aumsville has over 150 staff members and was one of the largest employers in the city, would your first guess be Blazers Industries?

Tucked away on 15+ acres of property on Olney Street is Blazers Industries, where they manufacture modular buildings. The company started in 1976 building portable restrooms for construction sites. Today in 2024 they are building homes, offices, and schools worldwide. This family-owned business originally started in Silverton, and eventually moved to Aumsville where it planted its roots in 1993, and has been here ever since. Mom, dad, two daughters, and one son all still work for this local company, which continues to grow.

Recently, Blazers was awarded a grant for five million dollars to build homes for those who were impacted by the fires in Detroit. Aumsville city staff had the opportunity to tour their 155,000 sq. ft. facilities recently and encourages the community to call and schedule a tour. Blazers Industries is involved with the city on many levels, including sponsoring Corn Festival, as well as helping the Community Food Bank.

BAPTISTS AND THE OREGON FRONTIER by Clifford R. Miller (1967) has been added to the AHS library. Boston school master Hall Jackson Kelley made several unsuccessful attempts to establish a Baptist presence in Oregon Country. Methodist missionaries had arrived in 1934, Presbyterians in 1836. Other denominations soon followed. The first Baptist congregation was established in 1844 at West Union by seven Baptist pioneers. There was no minister and no church building. They met monthly in private homes. This location in Washington County, west of Portland. The first minister came in 1845. By 1848, there were five Baptist Churches in sparsely populated Oregon.

Cascade School District- Drive your Tractor to School Day



Drive your Tractor to School day is an annual tradition at Cascade High School. This year, it was during Future Farmers of America (FFA) week and several students braved the rain and drove six tractors, two of which

were open cabs, to school. While six tractors may not seem like much, they represent Cascade High School's FFA program and agricultural category of the Career and Technical Education (CTE) program. Both the FFA and CTE are seeing an increase in students joining or completing classes. Over 77% of the current senior class have taken at least one CTE class.

The CTE program at Cascade High School gives students the opportunity to learn trade and career skills and even receive certifications like a food handlers license or lift certification while in high school. The program encompasses five categories: agriculture, manufacture/construction, culinary and hospitality, health services, and small engines and auto program. The small engines and auto program is one of the newer subjects offered to students. And recently, the culinary and hospitality classroom was given a major upgrade with new industrial counters, refrigerators, sinks, and other supplies you would find in a restaurant or catering business.

When talking with the students who had driven their tractors to school about what they think of the CTE program the consensus was it gives them the opportunity to look at careers, not just college. - Celia Lemhouse, City of Aumsville Staff



January 2024 Monthly Police Report


DEPARTMENT MESSAGE:



Aumsville City Council Minutes 1-22-24

Mayor Angelica Ceja called the meeting to order at 7:01 PM. Present were Mayor Angelica Ceja, Councilors Della Seney, Doug Cox, Katie Wallace, Scott Lee, and Walter Wick. Council absent: Nico Casarez. Staff Assistant present: Citv Administrator (ACA) Kirsti Pizzuto, Assistant Public Works Director (APWD) Matt Etzel. and Administrative Assistant Celia Lemhouse.

The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

AGENDA APPROVAL:

Councilor Senev moved to approve the agenda as amended, removing the City Administrator's report. seconded. Councilor Wick Council present voted unanimously to approve the amended agenda. Amended agenda approved.

CONSENT AGENDA:

Councilor Seney moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Councilor Wick seconded the motion. Council present voted unanimously to approve the consent agenda. Motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

a) TMG – Hypochlorite Generator Replacement APWD Etzel presented the staff report and proposal for a new generator, as the current generator is aging, and parts are discontinued. Councilor Seney moved to approve the TMG proposal for the installation and purchase of 1 Wallace and Tiernan OSEC L Hypochlorite Generator for \$47,503.00 as presented by staff.

Councilor Wick seconded. Council present voted unanimously to approve the motion. Motion passed.

b) Patrol Vehicle Contract

ACA Pizzuto presented the staff report to receive approval of the invoices for two police vehicles that had been previously approved by Council September 2023.

Councilor Cox moved to authorize the City to purchase two new police vehicles in the amount of \$87,192.40 from Roberson Motors as presented by staff. Councilor Seney seconded. Council present voted unanimously to approve the motion. Motion passed.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES:

Councilor Seney gave an update that at the SKATS meeting on January 23rd the Aumsville letter will be presented.

Councilor Cox attended the local Public Safety Coordinating Council meeting stating that the City of Salem ordered a Gun Violence Study to be conducted. Councilor Cox has a copy of the results of the report should the council have an interest in reviewing.

Mayor Ceja said she would be interested in reviewing the report.

Mayor Ceja stated the League of Oregon Cities sent out registration information for the Spring Conference, and recommended council attend the conference if they are able to. Councilor Cox made inaudible comments about the benefit of the last conference they attended in October 2023.

Mayor Ceja adjourned the meeting without prejudice at 7:14 PM.
