

CASCADE SCHOOL DISTRICT UPDATES

On April 20, the Cascade School District transitioned from hybrid to its "Every Student. Every Day" model. All K-12 students are in person at school five days a week.

This move came after Governor Kate Brown and the Oregon Department of Education announced that students in classrooms only required three feet of social distancing

rather than six. Six feet is still the required distance for eating, physical education, recess, music, and other activities where more students rotate through.

"Our students have made tremendous progress coming to school on a more regular basis," explained Darin Drill, Cascade School District's superintendent. "We wanted to build on what we were doing and continue to offer more opportunities for students. Our safety team has worked hard to make

sure our buildings and protocols meet the state requirements to keep everyone as safe as possible while at school."

The district will continue offering an online-only program for those families who are not comfortable with in-person

learning, or who have found success with distance learning.

As the district starts to prepare for the 2021-22 school year, Cascade announced some administrative changes.

The current high school principal, Matt Thatcher, will be taking on a new district-wide position as director of edu-

cation. He will oversee curriculum, instruction, assessments, and professional development. He will also be responsible for the district's AV-ID and TAG programs.

Pete Rasmussen, the current junior high principal, will take over as the high school principal.

"Both Matt [Thatcher] and Pete [Rasmussen] have served our district for many years," said Drill. "I expect them both to be successful in their new roles and continue mak-

ing a positive impact on our schools and community."

Thatcher and Rasmussen will start their new positions on August 1. The Cascade School District will begin the interview process for a new Junior High principal.



STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT



Hello – At the time of this writing, the cherry trees on the Capitol mall have begun to create beautiful pink snow and the House has returned to daily floor sessions. Committee work continues with the House

committees now scrutinizing work done by the Senate. Mid-May brings the second chamber deadline when again, more bills will die. The first chamber deadline behind us and the second chamber deadline looming.

We are hard at work on the floor of the House passing pieces of legislation. HB 2508 received immense bipartisan support and makes telehealth visits an option for patients whose ailments can be addressed via video. During this COVID19 culture telehealth visits for mental health concerns have been tremendously valuable. Other notable pieces of legislation recently passed include HB 2006 which addresses homelessness, and HB 3178 which includes a technical fix for those on unemployment as a result of the continued shutdown of our businesses. These three pieces of legislation relate directly to the circumstances we are experiencing in this COVID19 culture.

We remain under the Governor's Executive Orders per-

taining to the COVID19 pandemic. You may recall my priorities for this session are to help bring relief to Oregonians who have been impacted by the pandemic, lost jobs, wildfires, and the ice storm. To ensure our schools are fully reopened, and for those individuals desiring a vaccine they may obtain one. Until our businesses are fully operational, our students are back in school 5 days a week, and we complete delivery of voluntary vaccines our work in the legislature should focus on relief and recovery for Oregon.

The final public hearings on Redistricting took place in mid-April. The Oregon Supreme Court granted the Legislature an extension on its constitutional deadline for submitting new legislative and congressional district maps due to census results being released late by the federal government. Now is the opportunity for Oregon to commit to a non-partisan and transparent redistricting process.

In the interim if we can be of help to you as you navigate your state government please call or email. My door is always open and my staff, Pam McClain, Lena Prine, and I welcome your participation. As your state representative, I am here to listen, respond, and lead.

The annual budget process is underway. The AFD operates like most government agencies on a July/ July Fiscal Year. A budget committee

has been appointed and is reviewing the proposals.

The AFD is waiting for results of several grant requests. One such request is for a temporary building to be placed on the property at 4th and Cleveland where the new administration building is sited. This temporary building would function as a place to accommodate volunteers at night who are serving our community from outside the District and need sleeping accommodations. Once the impact of the pandemic has subsided the District will propose a levy to build a permanent structure on site. Other requests include a Lucas CPR device and protective gear for wildland firefighting.

Aumsville Historical Society

Every community needs a bank. Aumsville got its first bank when the brothers, Hudson and Judson Rosenberg, built a small brick building on the corner of Main and 6th in 1909. They incorporated Aumsville State Bank and opened it in 1912. In 1913 the bank was sold to some local men. By 1933 Edgar T. Pierce was its president. On June 24th, Mrs. Pierce was working alone in the bank when an armed man robbed her of about \$685 from the cashier's drawer. He drove away in a



new Ford coupe. Police soon learned that he had stolen the car in one place and the license plates in another. Two days later he was apprehended in Medford.

1933 was a difficult economic year; many banks failed. In September the Aumsville bank was voluntarily liquidated. A local committee presided and all the depositors recovered their money. Aumsville did not have another bank until 1972 when Western Security set up a mobile bank. Business was conducted from a bus for about four hours on Mondays and Thursdays. The same bus also served Turner, Sublimity and Lyons. It was driven by bank manager Elmer Duncan. This service lasted until December 1976.

Santiam Valley Bank was established in Aumsville in 1979 in a temporary building. Mayor Joel Mathias did the ribbon cutting. In August 1980, ground was broken for a new building at 112 Main. American Pacific Bank soon assumed ownership of Santiam and provided services until 2005 when American Pacific was bought by Riverview Bancorp. Riverview Community Bank continues to meet Aumsville's banking needs and is an active supporter of community activities.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL

Minutes – March 8, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger, Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Lee, Seney, and Wick. Council absent: None. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding), Public Works Director Oslie, Assistant Public Works Director Etzel, City Engineer Brugato, and City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present via Zoom. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

PRESENTATION: Wastewater Treatment Plant Presentation Public Works Assistant Director Matt Etzel introduced himself, Public Works Director Steve Oslie, and Chris Brugato from Westech Engineering. He walked Council through a slide presentation on the timeline of what has been happening with our wastewater treatment system.

The city's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit has expired, and we are waiting on DEO for renewal. Since our last permit DEQ has lowered the allowable levels of ammonia that can be discharged into Beaver Creek. Our current system will never be able to achieve these low levels. DEQ representatives informed the city that the new permit would require lower levels of ammonia in the discharged water and that they will be enforcing compliance. To achieve the lower ammonia limit, the city would be required to upgrade the current lagoon system to a mechanical treatment facility with a cost estimate of 10-15 million dollars.

January 2020, with the help of consultants/city engineer, the city agreed to a Mutual Agreement Order (MAO)

with DEQ. The MAO requires the city to move forward with bringing the treatment facility into compliance by building a mechanical treatment facility or adding additional treatment systems. Milestones must be met by the city or face enforcement penalties which could be thousands of dollars per day. (These milestones are listed in the full version of the minutes that are posted on our website).

Once DEQ assigns us a new permit we There were two online attendees and have six months to finish a facilities plan. Westech Engineering has started the preliminary work on this plan and are just waiting on the new permit requirements in order to finish it. We are looking at 18 months from now to have this done. One year after plans are approved we have to have a contractor lined up to start the \$10-15M project. That realistically puts us only 2.5 years away from construction.

CA Harding introduced a video that staff put together to educate the public about the needed updates to the city's wastewater treatment plant. The the east side park design. video gives the viewer a tour of our facility and the future improvements that are necessary for the health and wellbeing of our community and environment. It also shows a comparison of a nearby mechanical plant. (The video is posted on the City of Aumsville YouTube channel and on our website).

Mayor Clevenger voiced concerns about how to go about making these upgrades happen with the least monetary impact to our citizens. CA Harding stated that he will be diligently seeking outside funding sources that are available to offset the cost. The information that we need to get out to

the public is that we have to do the upgrades, we are mandated by the Federal EPA to meet these standards, and it is going to be a substantial amount of money. How much money is still unclear. It is important that the community stays engaged and educates themselves on this process. CA Harding encouraged Council to communicate this message to the public.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT:

there was no public comment. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

City Administrator Report: CA Harding reported that Marion County has agreed to lower the speed limit on Bishop Rd. north of Mill Creek Rd. to 25mph. This will go into effect as soon as county gets the new speed limit signs posted.

The city has received a \$13,000 grant to assist with a park master plan for

CA Harding told Council that it is a challenging time, but also an exciting time. He sees lots of good things happening in the city.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL

Minutes – March 22, 2021

The meeting called to order at 7:00 PM via Zoom Conferencing. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger, Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Wick, and Seney. Council absent: Lee. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding) and City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present via Zoom. The meeting was

video recorded to be released later.

PRESENTATION: Cascade School **District Bond Presentation** Superintendent Drill, Aumsville Elementary Principal Ganfield, Aumsville Elementary Assistant Principal Mintzer, and Director of Communication Sattler joined Council and gave a presentation explaining the Cascade School District (CSD) Proposed Bond Measure. The measure would encompass the needed upgrades for Aumsville, Turner, Cloverdale elementary schools, Cascade Opportunity Center, and both the Junior and Senior High schools. They explained how the bond would affect property taxes, adding \$.92 per \$1000 of assessed value to the current rate \$1.21. The State of Oregon has awarded a matching funds grant that the district could only receive if the bond passes.

The bond funds will address health, safety, and security concerns such as better ventilation for a number of schools; add needed classrooms to keep up with community growth; make repairs and energy efficient upgrades; and enhance vocational programs for students pursuing a health services, science, or trades career. If passed the bond would add ten new classrooms to Aumsville Elementary and renovate six, as well as update the security system, add a new gymnasium, and reconfigure the parking lot for safer traffic flow.

Councilor Ecclestone asked if this would open job opportunities for teachers. CSD Superintendent Drill answered yes, by adding new classrooms there will be a need for additional teachers. He projected that the district would be growing by approximately 400 students in the next few years and their goal is to avoid classroom overcrowding.

VISITORS AND PUBLIC COMMENT:

There were two online attendees and there was no public comment. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

NEW BUSINESS:

There have been a couple of occasions this year where the city has lost power, or we have experienced equipment breakdowns, and the water reservoir has become extremely low. Staff agrees with our city engineers that a critical piece, that will be a priority in the new plan, and is a priority in the current plan, is emergency generation of the main water reservoir. CA Harding stated that this project has been discussed with Council on several occasions and staff has made a number of unsuccessful attempts to receive grant funds to assist with this project. Council unanimously approved the Design Engineering Proposal for a new Booster Station Auxiliary Power Generator.

At one of the Council retreat planning sessions, staff presented ideas to help the city meet Council goals. One idea was to remove some of the barriers in the Interchange Development (ID) zone that potential investors face. Staff proposed that the city move forward with the design of both Del Mar Street east and west intersections. Del Mar Street east will be the main access to the ID zone property. If the city designs the intersection, it will give investors a better understanding of the total cost of offsite improvements. Eliminating this uncertainty by knowing the improvements needed could help spur the ID Zone development.

The city has collected Transportation System Development Charges (SDCs) for a number of years, and these funds can only be used for growth related or partially growth related projects. Even though both projects may be constructed by development, the city has collected SDC funds that can be used to design the intersections. Council unanimously approved the service contract with Westech Engineering, Inc. in the amount of \$364,020.00 from Transportation Fund #30 to design Del Mar Street east and west intersections improvements.

City Administrator Report: CA Harding reported that there have been 265 COVID-19 cases accumulative in our zip code since the onset. He stated that this comparatively is a low number, and our community has done a good job of preventative measures.

The new ballot drop box is in and will be installed in time for the upcoming election.

The Event Planning Committee will soon start Corn Festival planning and CA Harding asked Council for some guidance. Council consensus was to plan for an in-person event but have a Plan B if the COVID restrictions will not allow the in-person event. They also agreed that we should keep it low key, then plan on expanding for 2022. CA Harding stated that the committee will be meeting on April 7th and he would bring back a draft of the plan at the next Council meeting.

Council recessed into an Executive Session at 7:48 PM

<u>EXECUTIVE SESSION:</u> Council entered into Executive Session - Under the authority of ORS 192.660(2)(d) to conduct deliberations with persons designated by the governing body to carry on labor negotiations. *Any executive session discussion is off the record, matters discussed are not to be disclosed.*

There was no outcome to report. Council reconvened to the general meeting and adjourned without prejudice at 8:09 PM.

The reserves worked a total of 148 hours during the month of March: 148 volunteer hours and 0 paid hours.

With Spring upon us, we are enjoying warmer weather and more citizens are out and about. As such, I wanted to remind everyone that we have City Ordinances to keep our city livable and safe.

Our Nuisance Ordinance 686 requires property owners to keep their grass and weeds cut. Under this ordinance we also cover placing any structures on the city sidewalks and streets. We are seeing many basketball stands being left in the street after use, please remove these from the street and/or sidewalk after use.

Under City Ordinance 697 we have requirements regarding the parking and storage of vehicles and trailers. All campers, trailers, and motorhomes are only allowed on a city street for 5 days in a consecutive 30 days period. Vehicles generally have to be driven and moved every 72 hours. This allows for the sweeping and cleaning of our streets and keeps parking spaces available for citizens.

Additionally under our Development Ordinance (section 18) staying in motorhomes and trailers is limited to 10 days in a 30 day period and on private property only. You can't connect to utilities either.

You can't put signs on street or power poles. Outside of that, signs can't be placed in the clear vision areas. What is clear vision? Imagine a triangle on the corner of every intersection of two streets, from the point go back 10 feet on both sides. Keeping this triangle clear of not only signage, but bushes and fences, allows for safer traffic. If your signage is in the clear vision triangle, or on a pole, it will be removed.

You can put signs on private property, with permission, as long as they are not impeding the clear vision area.
