The Circus is coming to town! On May 24th, 2024, Aumsville will be hosting the Culpepper and Merriweather Circus at Mill Creek Park where they will be performing two shows. Ticket sales are open and can be purchased in advance at City Hall or online at the Culpepper and Merriweather Circus website. Tickets will be available for full price at the door if there is capacity. Advanced tickets cost \$8 for children and \$13 for adults. If attendees purchase tickets at the gate, they will be \$9 for children and \$16 for adults. **Advanced children's tickets are free with the purchase of an adult ticket at City Hall while supplies last.**

Solicitors: What to Know

As the weather begins to warm, we will see more and more solicitors in the city and neighborhoods. There is some important information you should know about these door-to-door salespeople.

First, understand state laws do not allow the city to ban door-to-door soliciting. We can require permits from the city but not outright ban them. However, you can do some things if you feel the door-to-door soliciting is unwanted and bothersome.

One thing you can do is post your property with “no trespassing” or “no soliciting” signs. Post this in a clearly visible location on an entry gate or your front door. If someone trespasses without your advance permission, you can call the police, and they can be trespassed from your property.

You can always choose not to answer the door, and certainly do not allow anyone to enter your home unwanted. I typically follow the philosophy at my house that if I make an appointment for services or goods, then I answer the door. If not, I do not care if someone knocks; I ignore them.

However, not everyone has that perspective, and door-to-door solicitors can be aggressive. They are often not from our community or even our state. Residents should be selective about who they allow into their homes and know they are not obligated to speak with any solicitors or allow anyone into their homes.

The city requires a license to be issued to each person, and in our requirements, we provide the license in a lanyard. If they are not wearing a lanyard with a city license and my original signature, they have no permit to be soliciting. It should also be noted that our licenses are for each person, not a company, and they are required to have them in their possession. When approached, some solicitors will say “My boss has the license,” or “I have one, I just don’t have it with me.” This is not acceptable. Each individual should have their own city-issued permit with them at all times while soliciting.

Our licenses do not include background checks, so do not assume this person has some clearance from the city, even if the city has issued a license. The license is like any other business license.

If you do not want to be bothered, remember these simple tips: 1) Post your property with “no trespassing” or “no soliciting” signs. 2) If someone enters without permission, call the police. 3) Simply do not answer the door if you don’t want to.

If you decide to engage solicitors, ensure they have a city lanyard; if not, call the police non-emergency number 503-749-2188.

If you feel harassed in any way, do not confront these individuals; simply contact the Aumsville Police Department and let them take care of it for you.

Many people spend long hours online or searching old documents in courthouses looking for family information. Roger Porter found a shortcut. He became acquainted with a lady who was a very close DNA match to him. She was looking for a Porter relative who was willing to accept a collection of Porter memorabilia. She had obtained these things from Maude Porter Boone's estate sale. (Maude is the lady for whom Aumsville's favorite park is named.) The items had belonged to Maude's father Henry C. Porter.

William Porter and family came over the Oregon Trail in 1848. William built a school on his farm southeast of present-day Aumsville. On Sundays church services were conducted there. William's son Henry established a real estate office at the corner of Main and 8th. He was very active in the new community of Aumsville. At the March AHS meeting, Roger displayed the contents of the case: family documents, letters and other papers.

The AHS museum season opened on Saturday, April 6th. It was not a spring-like day. In spite of the cold rain and wind, numerous people gathered inside the museum to look at recently acquired items and share memories of earlier AHS events. The museum will be open on Saturdays from 11am-2pm, except for holiday weekends.

AHS met on Thursday, April 11th. Pizza and other buffet items were enjoyed prior to the business meeting. The recent show-and-tell event hosted by Turner's historical group was discussed. Friends,
We finished our 2024 Legislative "short" Session on March 7th. I am very pleased to report that during the 2024 Session Aumsville was awarded an additional \$4 million in capital funding for the wastewater treatment plant and related improvements, bringing the total state funds awarded to \$9 million for the biennium. The biggest issue of the session was Ballot Measure 110 reform. While there is still much more work to be done, we were able to recriminalize

hard drugs once again, in part reversing the failed policies that have led to drug use on our streets and in our parks. It provides for supervised probation which can consist of drug treatment and recovery services. It also gives law enforcement the necessary tools to go after drug dealers. While there are good things in this bill, there are also some serious flaws. That means the battle to reverse the damage from Measure 110 is far from over. We need to ensure that local leadership embraces this new law and that we have the funding for the evidence-based treatment and recovery solutions we know we need. I'm going to continue to work to strengthen this legislation. During the interim I will be working to identify and prepare good legislation for the 2025 session. If you have ideas or concerns, I want to hear from you. Don't hesitate to reach out to my office via email or

phone call. We have some bold plans to get back to the basics of good governance and I encourage you to sign up for my newsletter to follow the progress throughout the year. I'm always open to meeting you for breakfast or a cup of coffee to talk about the issues of interest to you!

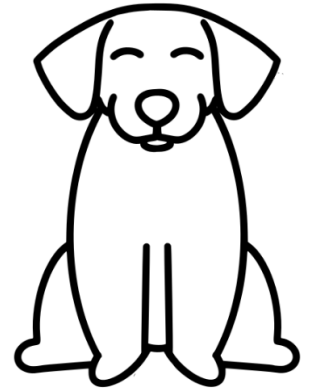

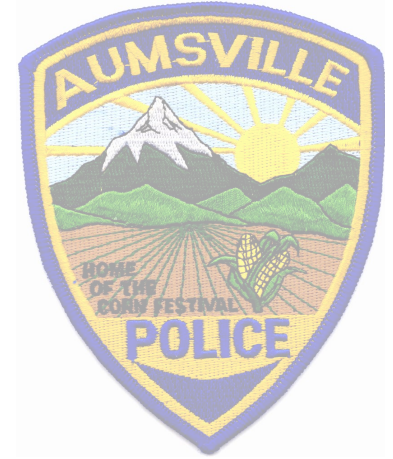
March 2024 Monthly Police Report

The following may not be complete minutes from these meetings. You can find the full approved minutes from all City Council meetings on our website at www.aumsville.us/city-council.

Mayor Angelica Ceja called the meeting to order at 7:01 PM. Present in person: Mayor Ceja, Councilors Casarez, Lee, Seney, Wallace, Cox, and Wick. Staff present: City Administrator (CA) Harding, Assistant Public Works Director (APWD) Etzel, Administrative Assistant (AA) Lemhouse. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

AGENDA APPROVAL: Councilor Seney moved to approve the agenda as amended. Councilor Wick seconded. Council voted unanimously to approve the amended agenda. Agenda approved.

CONSENT AGENDA: Councilor Casarez moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Councilor Seney seconded the motion. Council voted unanimously to approve the agenda. Motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

Westech EJCDC Service Agreement - Wastewater Treatment Facility Design

APWD Etzel presented the amended contract. APWD Etzel explained that the City had to convert the City Engineer into an EJCDC contract in order to meet USDA requirements.

Councilor Seney moved to approve the EJCDC Contract between Westech and the City of Aumsville as presented by staff. Councilor Casarez seconded the motion. Council voted unanimously to pass the motion. Motion passed.

Phone System Selection

APWD Etzel explained the City's phone system is no longer serviceable, as parts can no longer be found and repair companies no longer service them. APWD Etzel then detailed issues the Police Department had been having with the phones and that parts of the system were no longer working. APWD Etzel stated that City staff had gotten together and each department had presented their needs, and these needs were put into a list. APWD Etzel said an RFP (Request for Proposal) was developed and put out to several different vendors. APWD Etzel stated that the committee scored the proposals and chose the Right! Systems proposal as the preferred option. APWD Etzel explained it covers all City needs, and

over time it would save the City money as well.

APWD Etzel explained that there would be a slightly higher cost upfront as the City would need to buy the equipment, program the phones, and get everything set up. But the City would save \$13,000 over the three-year contract cycle. APWD Etzel added that since the City will own the phones, they could be carried to a different provider after 3 years should the City choose to. APWD Etzel added the City will also save money by incorporating the whole City at once, including the new public works building.

Councilor Seney moved to approve the Right! System Inc's proposal for \$33,549.66 along with upgrades to the existing fire and security alarm system \$1,549 as presented by staff. Councilor Casarez seconded. Council voted unanimously to pass the motion. Motion passed.

2024 Aumsville Corn Festival Grand Marshal

Council discussed several nominees, including the Shetler family, Rocio Diaz, Ryan Sarai, and Mike Cline. After deliberations, Mayor Ceja asked if Council could do a poll to pick the Grand Marshal.

Councilor Lee commented that having a first, second, and third choice would allow Council to narrow down nominees for Grand Marshal. Councilor Casarez added that would also allow a second and third option or Grand Marshal if the first nominee was declined or unable to attend Corn Festival. CA Harding agreed and said he would send out the poll and bring the results to the next Council meeting.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT: CA Harding stated there was no report other than SB 5701 was awaiting the Governor's signature. CA Harding explained the City is preparing suggestions for this year's budget cycle which has a lot of behind-the-scenes work. CA Harding stated this is the year to do Citywide salary surveys and there would be a committee formed from members of each department which then gives recommendations. CA

Harding added he would then bring those recommendations to the next meeting if they are sound and within the budget. CA Harding explained COLAs (Cost-of-Living Adjustments) have settled down and the current industry comparables look good.

CA Harding mentioned the Public Works facility project is continuing and may need some additional equipment. CA Harding added so far, they have just been authorizing equipment as needed to make sure they don't go over budget.

CA Harding provided a summary of the upcoming events, mentioning the Easter Egg hunt Saturday in Mill Creek Park at 10 am, and the Volunteer Appreciation Social on the 12th of April 6-8 pm. CA Harding noted the City had a save-the-date spread in the Newsletter for the Circus and that once the tickets come in the City will begin selling them.

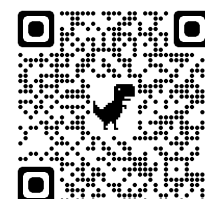
CA Harding suggested asking some businesses to donate a certain dollar amount towards ticket purchases for kids at the Elementary School.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES: Councilor Seney stated the SKATS meeting was the following day and the agenda included a vote on whether or not to add Aumsville as a voting member.

Councilor Wallace asked if Aumsville wanted to be a part of the SKATS Committee.

Councilor Seney replied that Aumsville had been put in by the Federal Government and it was a formality to have the vote to let Aumsville join. Until Aumsville is voted in, however, Aumsville would not get a say in SKATS decisions.

Mayor Ceja adjourned the meeting without prejudice at 7:42 PM.
