\*To drop off yard debris and/or pick up a yard of organic compost free of charge, residents will be required to show a valid driver's license with an Aumsville city limits address or a recent City of Aumsville Water/Sewer bill; Aumsville business owners, a business card with an Aumsville city limits address; city staff, an official City of Aumsville business card.

FYI: Aumsville residents may use the leaf and yard clippings drop off for free year-round. Twice a year Recology offers a yard of free compost. They have currently gone to their winter hours: 8am to 4pm, Monday through Friday. Closed on the weekends.



## CASCADE SCHOOL DISTRICT NEWS

The second month of the school year at the Cascade School District was busy. Across the district, students are learning and growing while schools also try to provide the fun activities of a normal school year. Some of the high-

lights include spirit weeks in each school, a homecoming football game and dance for high school students, new vocational classes like small engine mechanics, athletics, activities and after-school clubs.

"Our staff continues to be creative and find ways to give students these experiences," said Superintendent Darin Drill. "I believe we have some of the best staff in

the state, and I am so grateful for their hard work every day."

In October, the Oregon Department of Education (ODE) released its annual At-A-Glance School and District Profiles. One of the districtwide key points is the freshmen on

-track rate which is the percentage of ninth-grade students who finish the year having completed at least 25% of the graduation requirements. For ninth-grade students, being on track to graduate after freshmen year is typically an indication of high school success and on-time graduation.

> State-wide, the freshmen ontrack rate dropped to 74% which is down from 85%. However, at the Cascade School District, that number held steady at 90%.

> "It's truly a testament to the hard work of our students and staff," added Drill. "The last year brought with it so many challenges, and for our freshmen on-track rate to remain one of the best in the state is incredible."

Students and staff worked after school and over the summer to recover credits.

#### AUMSVILLE RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

Good day, Neighbor!

As we creep into the fall season, cold temperatures are upon us and bring



with them the many hazards your Fire District deals with. Backyard burning of leaves and storm debris is in full swing, and the smoke from summer field fires and wildfires is replaced by the haze of burning leaves. Wood stoves are up and running in many homes in this area, adding to the haze and various smells that come with fires.

As firefighters, we see these everyday occurrences sometimes result in tragedy. Seldom does a season go by where we do not respond to chimney fires, overheated wood stoves due to overfiring, backyard burns out of control and threatening structures, and injuries caused by the use of liquid accelerants to start burn piles. Keep safety in mind when you are engaged in using fire for any reason.

Frost and ice often result in problems faced by firefighters. While slips and falls are common causes for medical alarms, icy roads are particularly hazardous to firefighters operating at accident scenes. Please slow down as you approach a stopped emergency vehicle.

As the days shorten and nights lengthen, finding your house if there is no visible address always becomes more difficult. While we have you plotted in our computer maps, these are not always accurate and precious seconds can be wasted while we search for numbers. Please make sure your address is visible from the street with adequate night lighting. If you need a driveway address sign installed, please look for the link to that service on our website.

As always, please consider becoming a volunteer for your local Fire District! We can use your help! We offer a lot of opportunity, but boredom is not one of them!

# AUMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

In 1857 three missionaries of the United Brethren Church made the arduous ship-board trip from New York to Oregon Territory. Rev. T. J. Connor was returning to his pastorate at Philomath, OT. Rev. Milton Wright and Rev. William H. Daugherty were on their way to support the work of the church in the Pacific Northwest. The latter was accompanied by his wife and young son.



During the Pacific portion of the trip and for months afterward, Rev. Wright suffered from disabling medical issues, then called Panama fever. The ministers traveled constantly, preaching and teaching. They accepted lodging and assistance where they could find it. Rev. Wright's diary contains numerous entries relating to hospitality provided in the Aumsville and Stayton area by early settlers Hadley Hobson and Gabriel Brown. In 1859 Rev. Wright was directed to return east for reassignment. He continued his missionary work there for many years. He married and had five children. Sons Wilber and Orville became famous as pioneers of flight.

William H. Daugherty was born in Marshall County, Virginia, which later became West Virginia. At a young age, he felt a deep religious calling. Rev. Wright's diary relates a lot about Daugherty's travels and sermons. In 1863 Rev. Daugherty was sent to sparsely-settled eastern Washington Territory to attract new converts and establish a church site there. Unfortunately, he became ill and passed away in 1865. He is buried in the Hobson-Whitney Cemetery east of Sublimity.

The widowed Mrs. Daugherty married John Rudolph and had two children. The family moved away from Marion County. Descendant Chris Gonyea and her husband Darrell from Minnesota recently honored the memory of Rev. Daugherty by visiting the Aumsville area.

#### STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

#### Friends –

Many things have transpired since the last time I communicated with you via this newsletter. Most significant is the redistricting of Oregon's House and Senate boundaries. While boundaries may change over time, my commitment to the greater Salem community remains steadfast. It is a privilege to serve the current com-

munities of south Salem, Turner, and Aumsville and to embrace a larger portion of Salem as

HD19 is transformed – as the good representative from Monmouth, Independence, and Salem stated:

"For a purpose known but to God, the Senate insisted on merging portions of what is now House District 19 and 21, created a district combining Keizer and North Salem, and split the remaining areas of Salem into districts reaching as far as Detroit Lake. The reorganization of the Salem-Keizer area was an unwelcome surprise."

As you can see from these maps HD19 is now completely Salem.

In addition, I was able to direct ARPA local community investments to the following groups:

- \$300,000 City of Aumsville
- \$300,000 City of Turner
- \$150,000 Willamette Career Center
- \$1.25 million United Way of the Mid-Willamette Valley. UWMWV will designate these investments to address: homelessness, relief nurseries, child abuse and prevention, wildfire relief, economic development, relief for small businesses, domestic abuse and human trafficking, at risk youth, childcare, education via career technical training, and respite and reflection support for families experiencing health crisis.

Last month these organizations received the formal paperwork that will allow them to move forward with the monetary designations.



# GOOD BEHAVIOR GAME IN LOCAL MARION COUNTY SCHOOLS

Tootles, PAX and Granny Wacky Prizes... These are just a few new things that school staff in Marion County have been learning from the Good Behavior Game. The Good Behavior Game is a powerful evidence-base practice that is used daily in classrooms. By incorporating these fun strategies every day, it helps children to improve their self -regulation which leads to some very positive outcomes.

The short and long-term results from this program are numerous. Students in PAX classroom have higher reading levels, reduced need for Special Education Service and higher graduation rates. Additionally, teachers report having a more peaceful classroom and less stress. But the results are not limited to just academic there are health outcomes as well! Students that have been in PAX classrooms have fewer symptoms of depression, reduced bullying, decreased thoughts of suicide and less substance abuse.

To date there have been almost 200 school staff trained across 7 districts in Marion County. The Marion County Prevention program had received a grant to train up to 400 school staff in Marion and Polk Counties. #### AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

#### AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL HIGH- \$2,735. There were a lot of good en-LIGHTS September 13, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Present in person were Council President Ceja, City Administrator (CA) Harding, and City Clerk Rogers. Councilors Casarez, Ecclestone, Lee, Seney, and Wick joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: Mayor Clevenger. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

#### VISITORS AND PUBLIC COM-

**MENT:** There were no online attendees and one in-person attendee. There was no public comment. Login information was provided for members of the community to make public comment at this time and listen to the discussion.

**CONSENT AGENDA:** Council reviewed the August 9, 2021 Council meeting minutes and unanimously approved the consent agenda as presented.

#### **City Administrator Report:**

Corn Festival Summary Report -PowerPoint presentation. CA Harding started the presentation with the Skate Park competition that was held on during the day on Friday, August 20th. There wasn't a lot to report other than it appeared to go well. The City contracted with CAAKES Unlimited to produce the event and we really didn't have to do much to make this event happen, CAAKES did it all.

Party in the Park later that evening was well received and well attended. Total revenue from this event was \$9,580. This included a \$5,000 sponsorship. Total expenses for the event were \$6,172 leaving \$3,408 revenue after expenses.

CA Harding reported that the parade was successful. We had \$3000 in sponsorships the expenses came to

tries.

The festival had a total of \$27,926 in revenue that includes \$15,797 in sponsorships and donations. The rest of the revenue was from parking fees, raffle sales, corn sales, and vendor fees. The cost of corn, materials, advertising, equipment rentals, and entertainment came to around \$10,000 for a profit approximately \$17,000.

CA Harding stated that 80+ volunteers plus city staff logged in over 1000 hours total time to pull off the event.

In Summary: total of 23 sponsors for all events \$22,500; total revenue from all events \$41,000; total expenses for all events \$21,000, leaving \$20,000 to divide between service groups.

Councilor Ecclestone thanked staff for all their hard work to make the festival come together. It was something that our community was needing. Councilor Casarez suggested that we schedule a section of a regular meeting for community members to come and brainstorm with Council for the 2022 Corn Festival. He would like to see the princess court come back. CA Harding stated that we do have monthly planning meetings. Typically, these meetings are on the first Wednesday of the month at 10:30 am. Anyone is welcome to attend. They can contact city hall for meeting details or to be put on an email list.

CA Harding reported that the city has created a survey that is available on our website for people to give feedback about the event. The survey information will be used to help improve the event next year. City Staff also met for a post event debriefing while things were still fresh in their minds.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND **INITIATIVES:** Councilor Ceja reported that she and Mayor Clevenger participated in the Congressional Redistricting meetings. Both gave statements on where Aumsville would get moved to and the effect it would have on our community.

**CORRESPONDENCE:** CA Harding stated that Council received a letter from the Cascade School District to thank them for their letter of support for local choice. The letter was emailed to Council prior to this meeting.


