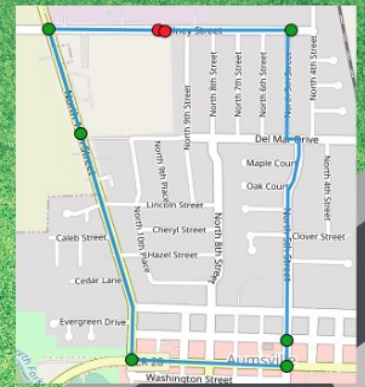

Recently, a man and a woman were driving east on SR 22. They saw a sign for Aumsville. The woman recalled that, as a youngster, she had often gone there from Vancouver, WA with her family to visit her father Wilmer Van Dyk's Donker "cousins". The travelers decided to detour to Aumsville to look for familiar sights. A shop owner directed them to Ted Shepard.

Soon they were in the museum reading about the Donker family and recalling details of the trips to Aumsville. Ted then escorted them to the site of the Donker home. The house burned in 1979. The property is now the Nichol farm (just west of Porter-Boone Park). The next stop was Aumsville Cemetery, where the entire Donker family is buried.

There are at least two

No one knows how many family trees are investigated without finding helpful documents to assemble lineage charts. Those searches are never seen. The link between the Donker and Van Dyk families is still a mystery. Perhaps they were neighbors or good friends back in Holland or met in the US after they immigrated.

The Aumsville Fire District received a \$35,000 seasonal personnel grant from the Office of the State Fire Marshal that allows us to staff a brush fire unit for the late summer and fall during our driest season. These personnel have already proven their worth on several local and regional fires that were contained quickly. We are encouraging the OSFM to continue this opportunity annually.

The architect firm hired by the District submitted a draft rendition of an addition/

remodel to the existing fire station for the Board to consider. The District will conduct a survey on our website and social media sites for public opinion. The property purchased by the District would become parking for the fire station. Backyard burning season should open October 15, depending on weather conditions. Please don't burn until the season is open, even if it rains. The burning seasons are determined with several factors that play a part; moisture is only one factor.

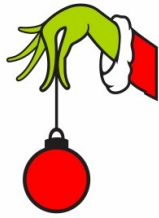

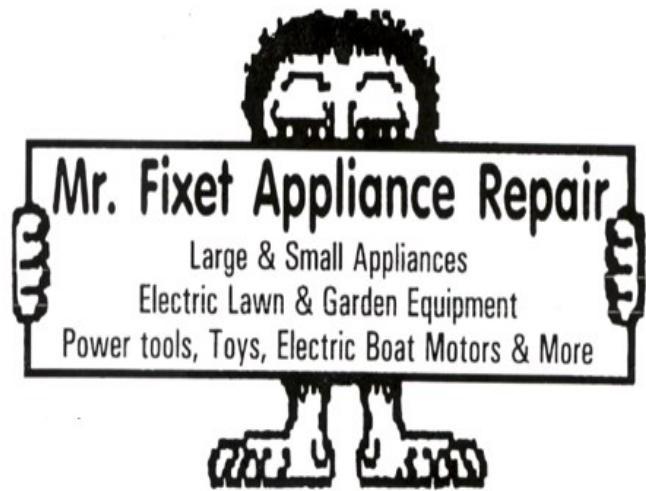

2022 ELECTION MEASURE INFORMATION

On August 8th, 2022 City Council voted to refer the question to voters for the following measures:

CITY OF AUMSVILLE BALLOT MEASURE 24-470

CAPTION: Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within Aumsville

QUESTION: Shall Aumsville prohibit psilocybin-related businesses from operating in the City?

SUMMARY: State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale, and purchase of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers.

The Aumsville City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters prohibiting psilocybin-related businesses from operating in Aumsville. Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the Aumsville city limits.

Explanatory Statement:

Approval of this measure would establish a prohibition on psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the City of Aumsville. Psilocybin is the psychedelic drug derived from certain mushrooms. Oregon voters legalized psilocybin through Ballot Measure 109 in 2020, which directs the Oregon Health Authority to develop a psilocybin licensing and regulatory program for the state by January 2, 2023.

Ballot Measure 109 allows a local government to adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters that prohibits the establishment of psilocybin-related businesses. The Aumsville City Council has adopted such an ordinance.

CITY OF AUMSVILLE BALLOT MEASURE 24-471

CAPTION: Allows certain marijuana-related facilities within Aumsville

QUESTION: Shall Aumsville allow medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana processors, and marijuana wholesalers in the City?

SUMMARY: State law allows for the operation of registered medical marijuana processors and dispensaries as well as for the operation of OLCC-licensed recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers.

State law also permits the voters of a city to adopt an ordinance that prohibits the establishment of any of these registered or licensed facilities within the city.

Aumsville voters adopted Ordinance 644 in November 2016 prohibiting such registered and licensed facilities within City limits. If approved, this measure would repeal and replace Ordinance 644 to allow registered medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, medical marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana processors, and marijuana wholesalers to operate within the City. Such facilities would still have to comply with other applicable laws, such as zoning code requirements.

Explanatory Statement:

Approval of this measure would allow registered medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, medical marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana processors, and marijuana wholesalers to operate in the City of Aumsville. State law allows for the operation of registered medical marijuana processors and dispensaries as well as for the operation of OLCC-licensed recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers.

Aumsville voters approved a ban on medical marijuana processing sites, medical marijuana dispensaries,

marijuana producers, marijuana processors, marijuana wholesalers, and marijuana retailers on November 8, 2016, which was enacted as Ordinance 644.

Under ORS 475C.457, a city council may repeal an ordinance that prohibits the establishment of certain types of marijuana-related businesses in the city, or the council may submit this repeal to the voters of the city. As such, the Aumsville City Council has referred this measure to the voters, which will effectively repeal Ordinance 644 and replace it with a new ordinance that will allow for the operation of registered medical marijuana dispensaries, marijuana retailers, medical marijuana processing sites, marijuana producers, marijuana processors, and marijuana wholesalers in the City.

If this measure passes, the City will be eligible to receive state marijuana tax revenues. If passed, this measure will go into effect 30 days after its approval by the voters.

CITY OF AUMSVILLE BALLOT MEASURE 24-472

CAPTION: Authorizing tax on recreational retail sales of marijuana items

QUESTION: Shall Aumsville impose a tax on the sale of marijuana items sold by recreational retailers as permitted by state law?

SUMMARY: Under state law, cities may adopt ordinances imposing up to a three percent tax or fee on the sale of recreational marijuana items in the city by state-licensed marijuana retailers as long as the ordinance is referred to the voters for approval at the next statewide general election. This measure seeks the required voter approval for the City to impose a tax on the retail sale of all marijuana items sold by an OLCC licensed marijuana retailer in the City in an amount equal to the maximum allowed by state law, which is currently equal to three percent.

If this measure is approved, the City would be authorized to impose a three percent tax on recreational marijuana sales in Aumsville and increase the amount of the tax if and when state law permits such increases.

Explanatory Statement: Approval of this measure would impose a three percent tax on the sale of marijuana items by a marijuana retailer within the City and permit increases in the amount of the tax if and when state law permits such increases. Under Measure 91, adopted by Oregon voters in November 2014, codified in ORS chapter 475C and amended by the Legislature, the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC) must license the retail sale of recreational marijuana. ORS 475C.453 provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance imposing a tax or fee on marijuana items (which include marijuana concentrates, extracts, edibles, and other products intended for human consumption and use) sold in the city by retailers licensed by OLCC, but the council must refer that ordinance to the voters at a statewide general election. The Aumsville City Council adopted an ordinance imposing a tax in an amount equal to the maximum permitted by state law on the sale of marijuana items by a retail licensee in the City, and, as a result, has referred this measure to the voters.

Under state law, if the City prohibits the establishment of medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, recreational marijuana processors, or recreational marijuana retailers, the city may not impose a tax or fee on the sale of recreational marijuana. The Aumsville City Council has also referred to voters for the November 8, 2022 election, a measure to allow these facilities in the City. The tax proposed by this measure will be collected only if the City does not have a prohibition in place on any of the marijuana facilities described above. In effect, if the voters do not approve the measure to allow these types of marijuana facilities in the City, this tax measure will not go into effect.

If approved, the tax would be paid by anyone buying recreational marijuana from a licensed retailer located in the City regardless of whether they are an Aumsville resident or not. The current tax rate would be equal to three percent of all retail sales and could be increased if and when state law permits such increases.

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL

July 25, 2022 Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Present in-person were Councilors Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Seney, Mayor Clevenger, City Administrator (CA) Ron Harding, and City Clerk Colleen Rogers. Councilors Lee, and Wick, joined via Zoom Conference call. Council absent: None. The meeting was video recorded to be released later.

PRESENTATION: Mayor Clevenger introduced and welcomed Angie Allbee, Section Manager for the Oregon Psilocybin Services section, housed within the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) Public Health Division's Center for Health Protection. Ms. Allbee gave an overview of the Oregon Psilocybin Service Act (OPSA) stating that they plan to start accepting applications on January 3, 2023. Her agency will be administering the licensing of the psilocybin service centers. She stated that the regulations haven't been solidified and they are still working on creating the rules. She encouraged Council to visit the website to view the administrative rules that have already been adopted. There were no in-person visitors and no online attendees.

Council unanimously approved the July 11, 2022 City Council meeting minutes as presented.

NEW BUSINESS: Council reviewed the Westech Engineering Proposal for Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements Preliminary Engineering and Environmental Reports JO 2969.3010.0. CA Harding explained that the city is working to meet the new requirements of our NPDES permit issued by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). Recently DEQ approved the city wastewater facility plan for 2022. The next step for the city is to have a completed preliminary engineering report and an environmental study

submitted to USDA and DEQ by October 31, 2022. This will qualify the city to obtain some limited funding from state and federal agencies. Staff has worked closely with Westech Engineering to access grants and discounted loans to assist with the wastewater facility planned improvements. He explained that the work proposed is essential to meeting those goals. Council unanimously voted to authorize the city to enter into a contract with Westech Engineering for Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements Preliminary Engineering and Environmental Reports JO 2969.3010.0 For \$81,763.00.

Council reviewed the service contract between the City of Aumsville and the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Government (MWVCOG). CA Harding stated that the Ford Family Foundation, Oregon Community Foundation, and state legislature HB 2345 have provided funds to assist the city in leveraging and administering the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds. These funds are at a 50% match for cities with populations under 35,000. The MWVCOG charges \$82.00 per hour plus material and expenses for grant assistance. With the grants available, the city can use this service for \$41.00 per hour plus travel expenses. The contract with the MWVCOG will allow the city to draw on these resources as needed.

CA Harding explained that we are currently administering four ARPA grants and are continuing to look for additional funding grants for the \$23,000,000 wastewater facility. This contract will provide another working group for us to help access some of the available funds at a lower cost. Council unanimously voted to authorize the City Administrator to sign the MWVCOG contract for grant services. CA Harding presented a draft letter to the Oregon State Historical

Preservation Office (SHPO). He explained that it is part of complying with state laws that protect cultural resources. The upcoming upgrades to the Public Works facility will require some digging and grading. The state requires that the city authorizes SHPO to conduct an archaeological investigation. Council unanimously voted to authorize the City Administrator to sign a letter to the Oregon State Historical Preservation Office on behalf of the City of Aumsville, authorizing SWCA Environmental Consultants to conduct archaeological testing on city-owned property at 955 Olney Street.

Council discussed the Oregon Psilocybin Service Act and concluded that this topic should be referred to the voters to decide and that the marijuana ban should also be referred back to the voters at the same time. Council unanimously voted to authorize staff to draft a ballot measure to refer the prohibition of psilocybin-related businesses within Aumsville city limits to the voters in the November 8, 2022 General Election. Council voted to authorize staff to draft a ballot measure to refer the marijuana ban back to the voters in the November 8, 2022 General Election. Motion APPROVED 6-1: (Yes: Councilors Casarez, Ceja, Ecclestone, Lee, Wick, and Mayor Clevenger. No: Seney.)

CITY ADMINISTRATOR REPORT: CA Harding reported that one of the booster pumps went out in our water system. Public Works will be getting it repaired and back online as soon as possible. With this pump offline, it puts additional load on the other pumps. It was decided that CA Harding will post on social media asking residents to conserve their usage for the next few days until the pump is back online. The regular meeting adjourned at 8:37

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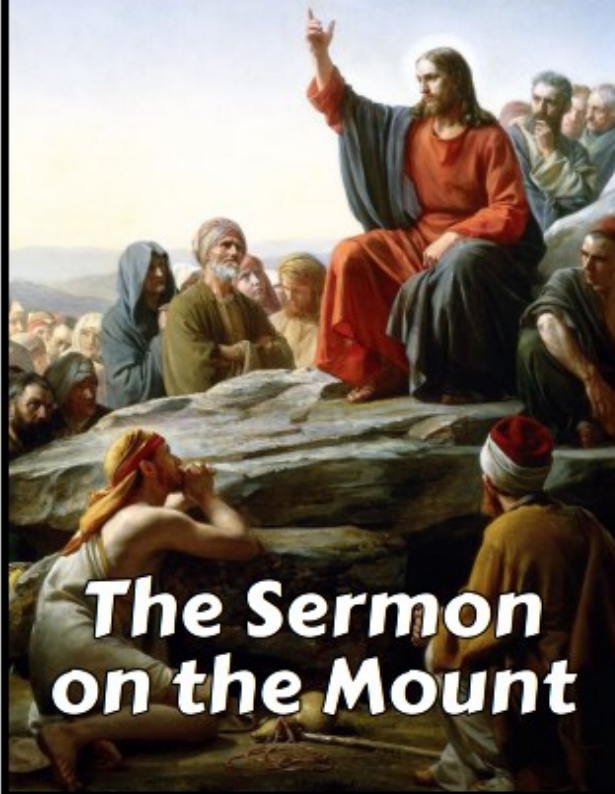
