PARADE GRAND MARSHAL- HAROLD WHITE



Former Mayor Harold White has served the City of Aumsville for more than 30 years. He served on the Planning Commission prior to being elected to office in 1987 and remained in office until the end 2016. Harold has served as the

Chair of the Aumsville Budget Committee. During his time as an elected official he saw Aumsville grow substantially. He was instrumental in building the City Hall/Police Department complex and the Wildwood Splash Park. All part of his vision to make Aumsville a "Great Place to Live". He saw the city through an F2 tornado in November 2010 and our City's Centennial Celebration August 2011.

Regionally, Harold has served on the League of Oregon Cities Board of Directors and President of the Oregon Mayors Association (OMA) where he served many years on their Board of Directors.

In 2000 he received the Mayors Leadership Award of Merit and in

2005 the Mayors Leadership Award.

When not serving our city Harold served as church Pastor for a number of years in Montana, Alaska, and Oregon. He has been involved as a chaplain for Nursing Home Ministries for 30+ years and also served as the District Chaplain. He continues to serve as a Nursing Home Ministries Board Member, Church Elder and Board Chaplain.

The 4th of July passed without major incident for the ARFPD, which we are always thankful for. Kudos to you for helping celebrate in a safe and sane manner.

The unusual July precipitation is a two-sided sword for the fire service; while it quells the chance of easy ignition in the short term, the resulting spurt of growth in grasses and brush that will inevitably dry out within weeks poses an additional risk for us.

It's Mother Nature at work, and we

deal with these anomalies as they come.

A reminder that field burning will begin soon, so be prepared for smoke. Keep in mind that the Fire District has little control over the time and amount of burning, even though we tend to get the calls. These burns are scheduled and authorized by the Department of Agriculture. By all means, if you observe a hostile fire that appears out of control, do call it in via 911.

The ARFPD is hosting another Blood Drive August 9. Our region is de-

pendent upon donations of blood, which is truly a renewable resource! Please help.

The annual Volunteer Firefighter Community Breakfast is Saturday, August 17th. Our firefighters and support team do an outstanding job and look forward to feeding the entire community! A recent addition to the museum is a segment of the 1900 Elections Poll Book for Aumsville Precinct. At that time,

Aumsville was a small village, surrounded by farms; incorporation did not take place until 1911. The list gives the names of 153 male residents, who had registered to vote in June 1900. There are no women's names because women could not vote. That changed, in part, thanks to Abigail Scott Duniway.

Abigail Scott was born in Illinois in 1834. In 1852, she made the arduous trip over the Oregon Trail with her family. She recorded the sights and events in a diary. She seemed destined to be a writer. She married Ben

Duniway and had six children. For some time, she operated a millinery and dressmaking shop in Albany. By 1871, they had moved to Portland. Abigail originated THE NORTH WEST NEWS. With her husband's help, they operated this weekly newspaper for sixteen years. Abigail wrote serialized stories, which were printed in the paper. She also penned the first novel written in the Pacific Northwest.

Abigail's personal objective was to bring about equal rights for women. She actively pursued this goal for

over 40 years. Five times the Oregon Legislature voted down women's suffrage. In 1912, on the sixth try, women were given the right to vote. In 1914,

Abigail was the first female in Oregon to cast a vote. Unfortunately, she passed away in 1915 and was not able to fully enjoy the fruit of her labor.

The museum will be open from 11 until 2 PM on Saturdays through October. It will open early on Corn Festival Day. Everyone is invited to the museum's tenth anniversary celebration on August 10th. 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AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL Minutes – June 10, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger and Councilors Bedwell, Casarez, Case, Ceja, Purdy, and Seney. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding), Finance Officer Hoyer (FO Hoyer), Public Works Director Oslie (PWD Oslie), and City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present.

Mayor Clevenger asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of Senator Jackie Winters he also stated that she had a long history of assisting the city as our Senator.

VISITORS: There were nine visitors in the audience and no one asked to speak during the public comment period.

PUBLIC HEARINGS: STATE REVENUE HEARING opened at 7:03 PM.

FO Hoyer explained that for the city to receive money from the State Revenue Sharing program and adopt it into the budget, we must hold a public hearing to consider public testimony on the proposed use of state revenue sharing funds to be received by the city. Mayor Clevenger asked if there was any public testimony and there was none. He asked Council if they had any questions or suggestions for the use of state revenue. There was no discussion of other possible uses. The Public Hearing closed at 7:07 PM.

Council reviewed and unani- mously approved:

Resolution No. 15-19 A RESOLUTION CERTIFYING MUNICIPAL SERVICES.

Resolution No. 16-19 A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE CITY'S ELECTION TO RECEIVE STATE REVENUES.

BUDGET HEARING – Fiscal Year 2019-2020 opened at 7:09 PM

FO Hoyer pointed out some minor clerical and budgetary corrections

that were outlined in the staff report. CA Harding stated that the budget looks good and the city is in a pretty good place with funding for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. The State Revenue Hearing closed at 7:12 PM.

Council reviewed and unani- mously approved:

Resolution No. 17-19 A RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE 2019-2020 FISCAL YEAR BUDGET, MAKING APPROPRIATIONS, AND IMPOSING CATEGORIZING TAXES with mentioned amendments. Council moved to approve Resolution No. 17-19 adopting the 2019-20 Fiscal Year Budget in the amount of \$10,175,909, as presented, and to levy taxes at the permanent rate of \$3.6327 per \$1000 of assessed value.

Resolution No. 18-19 A RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE CITY OF AUMSVILLE'S WORKERS' COMPENSATION COVERAGE TO VOLUNTEERS OF THE CITY OF AUMSVILLE POLICY YEAR 2019-2020.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S RE- PORT:

The PARC Summer Kids Program is gearing up for movies in the park to start on Saturday June 15th, and the Friday Day Camp begins on June 21st. The Super Hero Carnival is scheduled for June 29th at Porter-Boone Park from 3:00 PM to 6:00 PM. CA Harding added that there has been a lot of interest from local businesses and several will have game booths set up with free prizes for the kids.

MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES:

Mayor Clevenger, along with Chief Schmitz and Representative Denyc Boles, had a booth at the June 8th Saturday Market to visit with people and answer questions. He stated that he had a conversation with Representative Boles regarding the railroad crossing upgrades and the Inter-

change Development zone. She suggested that we get in touch with Senator Fred Girod.

Councilor Case asked about crosswalks on 11th street and safety for school children. CA Harding explained that we are at the mercy of Marion County at this time. He explained that the county has had a turnover of staff and he feels that we will get a design once they have settled. He stated that in the interim the school can initiate a school crossing guard program and Marion County has suggested that in the past. Councilor Seney stated that approaching the school board would be a good idea.

Minute Highlights – June 24, 2019

Mayor Clevenger called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. Council present was: Mayor Clevenger and Councilors Casarez, Case, Ceja, Purdy, and Seney. Council Bedwell joined via cell phone. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding), and Clerk Colleen Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present. VISITORS: There were twelve visitors in the audience and no one asked to speak during the public comment period.

NEW BUSINESS:

CA Harding explained that the ordinance amendments of Ord. 405 and 505, to allow the terms of the Corn Festival Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), are based on the requests of Council at a previous meeting. He stated that the City Attorney reviewed the ordinance as well as the MOU and made changes that he felt were necessary, focusing mainly on indemnity. He pointed out that, in their packets, they also have a copy of the executed contract for the use of the property north of Porter-Boone Park.

Council discussed the MOU and made the following suggested some edits.

Mayor Clevenger read by title only No. 668 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES 405 AND 505 REGULATING THE CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IN CITY PARKS AND PUBLIC PLACES. A motion was made and seconded. Motion APPROVED 5-2: (Yes: Bedwell, Clevenger, Casarez, Case, and Ceja. No: Purdy and Seney).

The second reading and adoption of the ordinance was moved to the next meeting. Based on our City Charter, the next step is that when the vote is not unanimous it goes onto the next meeting agenda for adoption.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: CA Harding reported that Public Works staff have been busy with Main Street beautification. They have hung flower baskets and flags and have done some cleaning at the skate park for better visibility. He announced that the summer events have started. We kicked off the season with a Movie-in-the-Park on June 15th, followed by the first Friday Kids on June 21st. We are gearing up for the Super Hero Carnival that is scheduled for June 29th. He stated that we have about 12 businesses and agencies participating this year.


