You will need to take down and remove your camping gear by 9:00 AM the next morning.

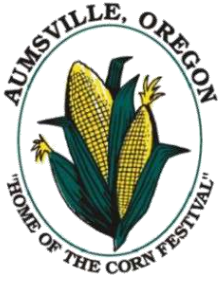
To this end, she was quick to assist in pulling diverse community stakehold-

## MESSAGE FROM COMMISSIONER KEVIN CAMERON

In early June, Marion's County Budget Committee met to approve the fiscal year 2019-2020 budget. We heard from the budget team and depart-

ments on county needs now and into the future. This year also marked Chief Administrative Officer, and Budget Officer, John Lattimer's final budget officer message. After 51 years in public service, John retired on June 30. What is clear, John has left his mark on Marion County and leaves us in a financially stable position and ready to meet the future needs of Marion County's residents.

The approved budget is \$455,271,158 with a total of 1,506.52 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. General Fund resources, our most flexible source of revenue, are \$103 million and all other funds totaling \$352,224,614. The budget includes sufficient contingency funds and a Rainy Day Fund for unforeseen costs.

While Marion County maintains adequate funding to continue current programs and services, the budget team and budget committee were faced with some difficult choices this budget cycle. County departments submitted more than 59 decision packages with 37 FTE this year. Had all been approved, future funding was in question. In his budget officer's message, John said, "Due to our estimate of future resources and our efforts to maintain a structurally balanced budget, I have had to deny several worthy decision packages."

The budget was adopted by the board at our June 19 regular board session. You can view the FY 2019-2020 budget and read the full Budget Officer's Message on the Marion County website at [www.co.marion.or.us/FIN/budget](http://www.co.marion.or.us/FIN/budget).

I am pleased with how the county has managed its finances under John Lattimer's leadership. As a county, we deliver not only quality services, but also innovative forward-thinking programs that maximize results within available resources. With John's retirement, my fellow commissioners and I have appointed long time employee Jan Fritz to service as chief administrative officer beginning

July 1.

Jan has extensive experience in government and business management. She has served Marion County for 25 years, as the county's deputy county administrative officer since 2007, and the county personnel officer since 2008. Her expertise ranges from banking to public administration, budgeting, financial management, and human resource management. Her knowledge of Marion County is a tremendous asset and her history of service speaks for itself. We are fortunate to have someone like Jan to take over from John Lattimer.

There was an inquiry on the AHS website regarding the religious persuasion of the Donker family. Over the years they participated in various Aumsville church groups. Daughter

Renske taught Sunday School for a long time. The family members are buried in Aumsville Cemetery. There is scripture on each of their tombstones. The last to

pass on were Gerben and Gilbert, who died when the family home burned in 1979. The newspaper quoted a local resident, who declared that they were "good old Christian fellows."

# FIREWORKS SAFETY

## Promote & Practice the FOUR BEs

### BE Prepared:

- Store fireworks out of children's reach.
- Always read and follow label directions.
- Place pets indoors; they are easily frightened by fireworks.
- Always have water handy (a garden hose or a bucket of water).

### BE Responsible:

- Soak used fireworks thoroughly in a bucket of water.
- Dispose of used fireworks & debris properly.
- Never re-light "dud" fireworks. Wait 15-20 minutes then soak it in a bucket of water.

### BE Safe:

- An adult should always light fireworks.
- Keep matches & lighters away from children.
- Use fireworks outdoors only.
- Light only one firework at a time & move away quickly.
- Keep children & pets away from fireworks.
- Always remember — do not throw fireworks or hold them in your hand.

### BE Aware:

- Use only legal fireworks.
- Use fireworks only in legal places.
- Fireworks are prohibited on all beaches, state parks, and state or federal forest lands.

# HOW TO STAY SAFE WHEN EXTREME HEAT THREATENS



## Find places in your community where you can go to get cool.

Keep your home cool by doing the following:

- Cover windows with drapes or shades.
- Weather-strip doors and windows.
- Use window reflectors, such as aluminum foil-covered cardboard, to reflect heat back outside.
- Add insulation to keep the heat out.
- Use attic fans to clear hot air.
- Install window air conditioners and insulate around them.

Learn to recognize the signs of heat-related illness.

Never leave a child, adult, or animal alone inside a vehicle on a warm day.



Find places with air conditioning. Libraries, shopping malls, and community centers can provide a cool place to take a break from the heat.

If you're outside, find shade. Wear a hat wide enough to protect your face.

Wear loose, light-weight, light-colored clothing.

Drink plenty of fluids to stay hydrated. If you or someone you care for is on a special diet, ask a doctor how best to accommodate it.

Do not use electric fans when the temperature outside is more than 95 degrees, as this could increase the risk of heat-related illness. Fans create air flow and a false sense of comfort, but do not reduce body temperature.

Avoid high-energy activities.

Check yourself, family members, and neighbors for signs of heat-related illness.



muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, dizziness, headache, nausea or vomiting, or fainting

- **Actions:** Go to an air-conditioned place and lie down. Loosen or remove clothing. Take a cool bath. Take sips of cool sports drinks with salt and sugar. Get medical help if symptoms get worse or last more than an hour.

## HEAT STROKE

- **Signs:** Extremely high body temperature (above 103 degrees) taken orally; red, hot, and dry skin with no sweat; rapid, strong pulse; dizziness; confusion; or unconsciousness
- **Actions:** Call 911 or get the person to a hospital immediately. Cool down with whatever methods are available until medical help arrives.

# AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

## Minutes – May 13, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM in the Community Center. Council present: Mayor Clevenger and Councilors Bedwell, Casarez, Case, Ceja, Purdy, and Seney. City Administrator Harding (CA Harding), and City Clerk Rogers (CC Rogers) were also present.

**VISITORS:** There were seven visitors in the audience and no one asked to speak during the public comment period.

Council unanimously approved the April 22, 2019 through May 7, 2019 check registers and the April 22, 2019 Council meeting minutes.

### NEW BUSINESS:

Council unanimously approved the following resolutions as presented:

Resolution No. 12-19 A RESOLUTION RE-AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S SIGNATURE.

Resolution No. 13-19 A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE

CITY ADMINISTRATOR AS A SIGNER FOR THE CITY ON GRANT APPLICATIONS AND CONTRACTS FOR USDA.

Resolution No. 14-19 A RESOLUTION RETITLING THE RECEPTIONIST/OFFICE ASSISTANT POSITION TO OFFICE ASSISTANT AND THE ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT TO OFFICE ASSISTANT

Council also unanimously approved the Aumsville Safety Manual Update as presented. CA Harding explained the updates include removing the city administrator from being required to have bloodborne pathogens certification, and modifying the language for exposure to outline what, and how long, the city would be liable for when paying for testing.

### CITY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

Water Color: CA Harding talked about the new water treatment process that Public Works is implementing by adding potassium permanganate to improve the taste and smell. They started the treatment with the

recommended dosage. Some areas experienced a pinkish/lavender color. Staff will continue to reduce the dilution until they find the balance for clearer water. He explained that this treatment is a common one used by other municipalities and at a low dilution, Oregon Health Authority claims there is no risk to users.

We have received both new police vehicles. The second vehicle is here but is still needing decals. The last leased vehicle has had decals and equipment removed and will be going back to motor pool.

**MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTS AND INITIATIVES:** Councilor Bedwell attended the County Commissioners meeting on housing. The homeless population is growing in small towns. There was a short discussion about shelters that Silverton recently put in and if ADUs are the answer.

The meeting adjourned without prejudice at 7:32 PM.

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## DELINQUENT BILLS AND SHUT OFF DAY—UTILITY CUSTOMERS PLEASE READ!

Near the end of each month the City suspends water service on delinquent accounts. Shut-off day is clearly posted on your delinquent bill, on the city's website ([www.aumsville.us](http://www.aumsville.us)), and on the calendar in the newsletter. If you need to make payment arrangements, contact City Hall and we can either work out a payment plan or connect you to resources.

A \$30 service interruption fee is assessed to each account that remains unpaid after 9:00 AM on shut-off day. Public works staff is then given a list

of addresses that must be shut off for non-payment. First-time delinquent accounts receive a warning via door hanger notice and will be given until 9:00 AM the next day before they are assessed similarly.

If you pay your bill after 9:00 AM but before Public Works arrives at your water meter, you can call City Hall to prevent your water from being shut off. However, the fee will still have been assessed to your account, since the bill was paid beyond the cut-off and staff time is being spent to ad-

minister your account.

If your water has been disconnected on shut-off day, the entire bill, including the \$30 service interruption fee, must be paid before service can be reconnected. We strongly encourage you to contact City Hall prior to shut-off day to avoid the additional \$30 fee.

# NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

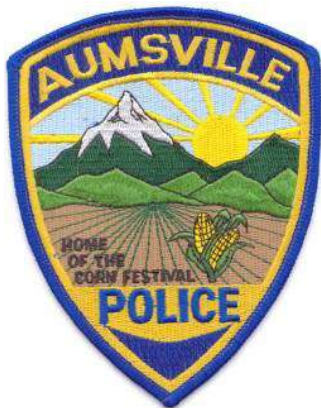

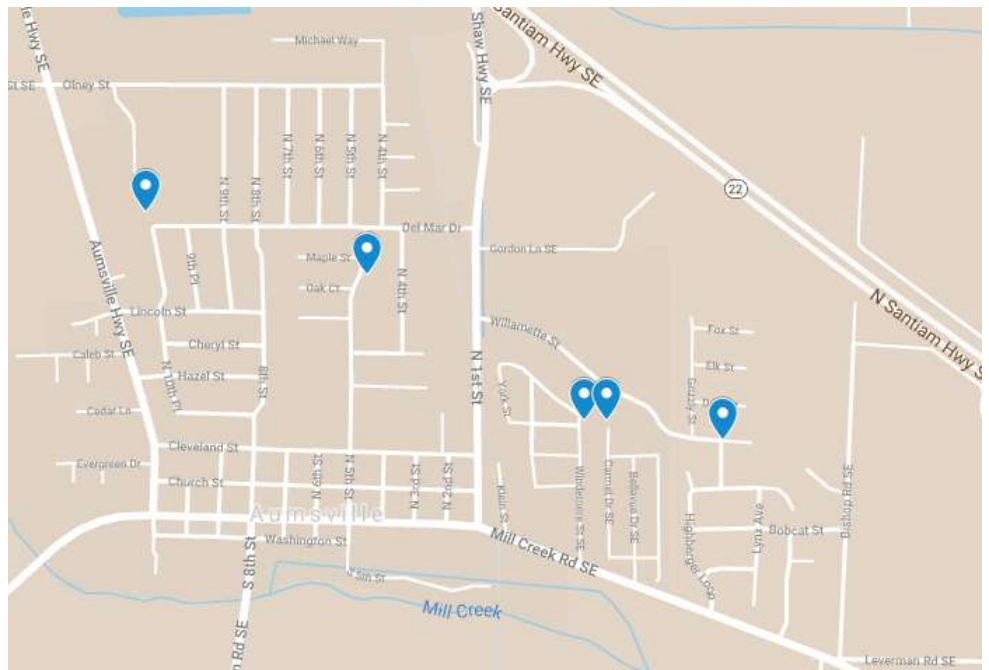
